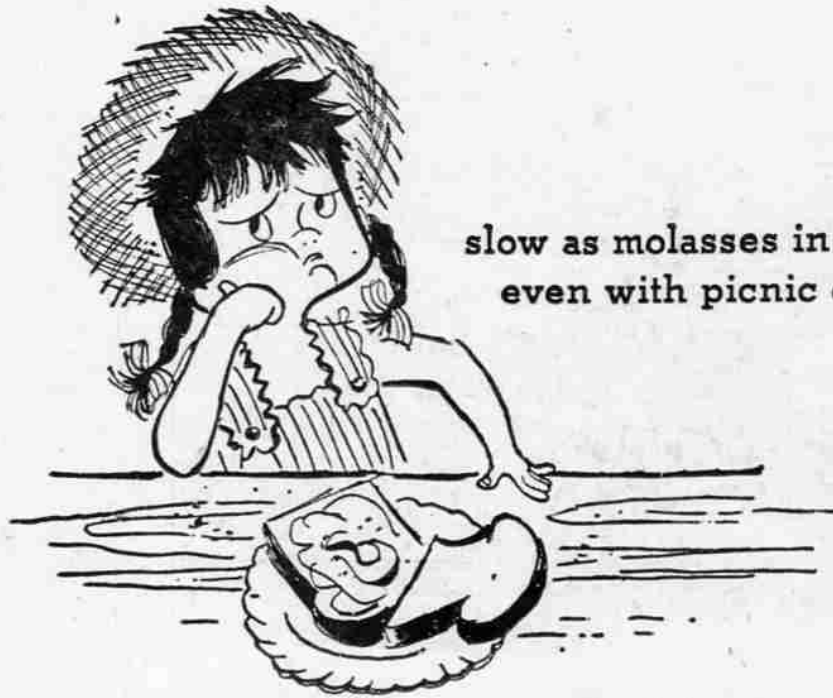
**Passing By**
