Fellow Travelers Getting Best Of House Un-American Hearings

Washington (U.P.)—The fellow travelers are getting the best of it in the House Committee on Un-American Activities investigation of fraudulent Communist uses of United States passports.

News dispatches of Paul Robeson's appearance this week were long on his table-pounding scolding of committee members and short on what the hearing is all about. It was that way with other witnesses in hearings of which Chairman Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.) gave the objective as this:

"To investigate the use of U.S. passports in the furtherance of the international Communist conspiracy."

Contempt Charge Urged

Robeson followed the Communist Fifth Amendment party line when he testified and has been proposed by the committee for citation on charges of contempt of Congress. The great Negro singer's testimony, if it could be called such, added up to 100 per cent Communist propaganda regardless of what his affiliations with the Reds may or may not be.

Robeson's strategy and that of scores of other such witnesses before congressional committees pay off by keeping the news reports centered on table-thumping and angry words away from the actual business of the inquiry.

The record will show that passport frauds are a common Communist racket. In the slang of a Communist agent, a phony passport is a "shoe." A procurer or maker of phony passports is a "shoemaker." The going price for a first class forgery needed for some urgent purpose has been placed at from \$3,000 to \$5,000 although hundreds of passports came into Communist possession for nothing at all.

From Unchallenged Report

The facts in the foregoing paragraph are not new. They come from the unchallenged 1946 report of the Canadian Royal Commission which turned up some

but far from all of the Communist espionage operations carried on in that country during and immediately after World War II.

Canadians made the embarrassing discovery that there was some passport fakery in their own government's passport office. That would not be likely in the United States. Under Mrs. Ruth B. Shipley for many years and more recently directed by Miss Frances G. Knight, there has been little chance of Communist infiltration into the U.S. Passport Office.

The Soviet Union spy chiefs did obtain U.S. passports, however, in wholesale lots from American citizens who fought on the Socialist side in the Spanish Civil War. Some passports were taken from the living and all were taken from the dead. That also is from the Canadian Commission report.
