Tax Rebate Forms Are Available Here

County Agent W. B. (Ben) Tucker today reported that applications for tax rebate on gasoline used for farm vehicles will soon be available in the county agents' office.

Congress recently authorized a rebate of 2 cents per gallon for gasoline used between Dec. 1, 1955, and July 1, 1956. Applications for rebate must be filed by Sept. 30 of this year, Tucker explained.

Following this year rebates will be given on a fiscal year basis from July 1 to July 1. Tucker was notified in a letter received Wednesday from B. C. Granquist, district director for the internal revenue bureau, that a shipment of application blanks was en route to the county agents' office.

Air, Water Pollution Factors 'Impossible' In Any New Industry

There is no question of air or water pollution involved in any prospective new industry in the valley, the board of directors of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce was told this morning.

Glenn Jackson, of the chamber's new industry committee, said it is "out of the question" for any industry which puts out quantities of smoke or fumes to locate in the valley, because of weather and topographical conditions which prevent free circulation of air and dispersal of fumes.

The committee, he reported, has gone into the subject in detail, and all involved are agreed that under present conditions an industry such as a pulp or paper manufacturing concern would create an impossible air pollution problem.

As for water pollution, Jackson reported, the state sanitary authority has set a low tolerance level for the Rogue river, which means that any high-effluent industry also is ruled out because of the problem of waste disposal. These two factors strictly limit the types of wood-waste industrial processes which can be accommodated in the valley, he explained. The objective at present is to interest some sort of fiberboard or similar manufacturer to locate here to take advantage of mill wastes without creating air and water pollution problems, Jackson stated.

The chamber board recently voted to underwrite half of a Stanford Research Institute study of the availability of wood waste resources here, and the types of industry which could use them. The Oregon development commission will pay the other half of the cost.
