

# Nixon Once Voted Same Facts Now Facing Ex-Manager, Democrats To Show

## Chotiner Protests Moves Made by Subcommittee

Washington—(U.P.)—Senate Democrats are prepared to show that Vice-President Richard M. Nixon voted in 1951 to compel Democratic politicians to reveal the same sort of facts about their law practices which his former campaign manager now balks at giving.

Attorney Murray M. Chotiner, Nixon's 1952 campaign manager and long time political adviser, has protested to every lawyer in Congress that it is "unfair" for the Senate investigating subcommittee to ask him to disclose:

1. A list of all his cases since Nixon became vice-president which had anything to do with the government, and how he got them.
2. The fees he received, and whether they were by cash or check.
3. The names of the government officials he contacted.

Chotiner also worked in political campaigns for Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) and for former Gov. Earl Warren, now Chief Justice of the United States. In the 1954 elections, he worked with the Republican National Committee to set up a nationwide speaking tour for Nixon.

GOP Chairman Leonard W. Hall said recently the national committee has no plans to use Chotiner in this year's campaign.

Informed sources said Democrats on the subcommittee are well aware their records show that on Sept. 26, 1951, Nixon—then a senator and a subcommittee member—voted with other members to compel a lawyer to disclose the names of all his clients who had dealings with the government.

### Bought Legal Practice

The attorney was Max Siskind of New York, part-time worker at the Democratic National Committee, who testified he had purchased the legal practice of Democratic National Chairman William M. Boyle Jr., when Boyle went on fulltime duty with the national committee.

The subcommittee was investigating the Reconstruction Finance Corp. and a loan it granted to Siskind's client, the American Lithofold Corp.

The late Sen. Clyde R. Hoey (D-N.C.), then chairman, ordered Siskind to name his other clients and the scope of their government business. Siskind protested that he had nothing to do with the case, as Chotiner has protested that his other clients had nothing to do with the subcommittee's investigation of graft in the purchase of military uniforms.

But Hoey ruled that the sub-

committee had voted unanimously that Siskind should disclose the names of his clients, what service he rendered them, and the government agencies he contacted.

**Nixon's Statements**  
The 1951 record shows that Nixon told Siskind: "... as far as the people are concerned, certainly the public generally is entitled to know what attorneys represent concerns who are operating before government agencies. And I cannot understand why there would be any reluctance at all on the part of Mr. Siskind or any other attorney to give information which the public is entitled to know." On the following day, Nixon asked Boyle: "you do not agree with the President (Mr. Truman) when he says that a voluntary worker for the national committee should not attempt to exercise influence in behalf of a client?" Boyle replied that he was a practicing lawyer and had a right to appear before government agencies "as long as it was proper."

Nixon retorted: "In this instance I agree with the President rather than with you."

### Ruth and Ruth Married at Ruth

## No Deal Brewing, Bridges Claims

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Harry Bridges, head of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, says reports that the ILWU and the Teamsters Union are negotiating a "deal" are "malicious and false."

A San Francisco newspaper, quoting "informed sources," said the ILWU is planning to turn over 15,000 warehousemen in its jurisdiction to the Teamsters. In return the Teamsters would supposedly help bring about a merger of longshoremen on East and West coasts. The newspaper said Louis Goldblatt ILWU secretary-treasurer, and James Hoffa, Central States chief of the Teamsters were conducting the negotiations.

Bridges said: "No deals have been made and no talks are in progress or contemplated. . . . the rumors are malicious as well as false."

In the past, Bridges' union and Dave Beck's Teamsters have fought bitterly over jurisdiction of waterfront workers.

## Gunman's Wife Defies Police

Indianapolis — (U.P.) — A gunman's shapely blonde wife today defied police efforts to learn where her husband fled after Indiana's biggest bank robbery in 28 years.

Mrs. Roy Rudolph Drake, 23, was captured Wednesday night in a station wagon loaded with \$18,000 in cash.

Police believed the \$18,000 was part of the \$66,546 stolen by a lone gunman at the suburban Southport bank last Monday. They have charged Mrs. Drake's husband, 32, former San Quentin convict and desperado, with the holdup.

The fugitive's wife was nonchalant and poised as she sat through hours of police grilling today.

"She won't give us anything more than her name and address," a policeman said.

She said only that her husband gave her the money a few days ago in Marshall, Ill., before leaving for California.

## Water Projects Measure Passed

Washington — (U.P.) — The Senate has passed a \$872,186,000 appropriation bill that would finance construction of water and power projects throughout the country during the year starting July 1.

The bill now goes to a conference committee for adjustment of differences with the House. The Senate added \$81,000,000 to House approved amounts.

The Senate approved the bill Wednesday without change from allocations voted last Friday by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

The bill includes \$642,436,000 for flood control and navigation projects of the Army Engineers, \$188,830,000 for the Bureau of Reclamation, \$26,100,000 for construction and operation of the Bonneville power system in the Pacific Northwest, and \$5,357,000 for the Tennessee Valley Authority.
