**Red Cross Offers To Reinstate Worker**

Seattle — (UP) — A veteran who had to resign a Red Cross position because the Army denied him security clearance for an overseas assignment said today he had been offered his old job back.

Irving I. August, 29, Seattle, confirmed an announcement that the Red Cross had offered to restore him to his job with retroactive pay.

August said he had been called Wednesday by the Red Cross from San Francisco with the offer.

"They hit me cold just after I had gotten out of bed so I told them I would think it over," he said. "They said they would call me again this morning. When they do, I'll tell them I'll be delighted to go back to work."

August, a World War II and Korean veteran, said he wanted a hearing on his case offered under the industrial security regulations administered by the Defense Department.

**Big Spender Lands In Hands of Law**

Milwaukee — (UP) — A "big spender from the West" came to Milwaukee to woo a 19-year-old girl, flashing a new car and stories of a gold mine back home.

Today Robert Chevalier, 23, Los Angeles, was under \$5,000 bail on a fugitive from justice warrant waiting extradition to California.

The girl's suspicious father did a little checking and found that Chevalier's wealth came, not from a Death Valley gold mine as he had claimed, but from a string of worthless checks in Los Angeles.

Milwaukee detectives also found that the romantic Chevalier was wanted in Eugene, Ore., for failure to support his 13-month-old son.

**Red China Population Said 582,600,000**

Washington — (UP) — The Census Bureau estimated today that Red China's 1953 population was 582,600,000—more than that of the United States and Russia combined.

The bureau said China's rate of increase each year also appears to be greater than either the United States or the U.S.S.R.

It said its estimates are based on Red China's press and radio reports.

Analysis of the Communist figures show that Red China's population includes 301,900,000 men and 280,700,000 women, or about 108 males to every 100 females.

**BALL FAN LAMENTS**

Chicago — (UP) — Delight became despair for Chicago Cubs fan Paul Garcia Wednesday, even though the Cubs beat the New York Giants 6-5. When Garcia returned to his car parked outside Wrigley Field, he found a home run by the Giant's Willie Mays had cracked the windshield and another by Chicago's Eddie Miksis had smashed the side window.

**Caudle, Connelly Declared Guilty**

St. Louis — (UP) — Two high Truman administration officials were convicted today of charges of conspiracy to defraud the government in the handling of a tax case.

The jury of eight men and four women deliberated nine hours and five minutes before reaching its verdict.

Judge Rubey M. Hulen announced after the verdict was read he would sentence Matthew J. Connelly, White House aide to former President Truman, and T. Lamar Caudle, former head of the Justice Department's Tax Division, July 19.

Neither Caudle nor Connelly had any immediate comment on the guilty verdict. Their attorneys, however, told the court they would file motions for a new trial.

Connelly and Caudle were found guilty of conspiring with Harry I. Schwimmer, a Kansas City, Mo., attorney, to allow a tax evader, Irving Sachs, to escape criminal trial or, if Sachs were tried, to avoid a prison term.

Sachs was indicted and fined \$40,000, but escaped a jail term because of his epileptic condition.

**Committee Delays Hells Canyon Vote**

Washington — (UP) — The Senate Interior committee delayed a vote today on the controversial Hells Canyon Project. The committee was reported to be waiting for the Democrats to fill a vacancy on the committee.

Chairman James E. Murray (D-Mont.), late Wednesday announced postponement of a meeting scheduled for today. His announcement said a number of committee members had other commitments.

But the postponement also was reported to have been made to allow Democratic members to get full credit for action on the bill. It would authorize a \$350,000,000 federal dam on the Snake River where a private utility has started work on a plan for smaller dams.

**Medical School Report Lauded by President**

Portland — (UP) — Dr. E. G. Chuinard, president of the Oregon State Medical Society, yesterday called the state medical school report made public Monday as "a great stride toward the final resolution" of differences that have existed between the society and the school.

Dr. Chuinard took exception to certain statements in the report but said the society welcomed it as being the first time the medical school had been willing to recognize the magnitude of the society's complaints directed at the school.

The medical school report was an 85-page document in defense of the school, offered in reply to a medical society report released earlier.
