Medford's Cheney Studs semi-pro baseball team head north tomorrow seeking their first win in history over the Drain Black Sox.

The Studs play a doubleheader tomorrow at 1:45 and 8 p.m. and stay overnight for a third game Sunday.

To face Drain the first night Manager Jack Cooney will probably call Don White to the mound for Medford. White is fresh from a two-hit shutout of Bend at the fairgrounds last Saturday.

The Sox are likely to throw their top pitcher, Glenn Elliott, former Portland Beaver, and before that, Boston Brave hurler.

The probable starting lineup for the Studs reads: catcher, Frank Roelandt; first base, Jack Cooney; second base, Dick Toney; short-stop, Jack Pederson; third base, Bob Selson; right field, Derald Wooten; center field, John Kovenz; left field, Jim Steffen or Terry Maddox.

Fish-Wildlife Separation Hit By Committee

The Citizens Committee on Natural Resources, Washington, D.C., has sent a bulletin to its local organizations urging help in the defeat of a bill now before Congress which would separate the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The committee bulletin refers to a bill passed by the Senate, sponsored by Senators Warren G. Magnuson of Washington and Thomas H. Kuchel of California. It would set up a semi-independent fisheries commission within the Department of the Interior and transfer to it all fisheries functions of the present Fish and Wildlife Service.

The bulletin condemns this as "an effort to appease disgruntled segments of the commercial fishing industry."

Signers of the bulletin include: Forest Conservation Society of America, National Parks association, National Wildlife Federation, Outdoor Writers association of America, Public Affairs Institute, Sport Fishing Institute, the Wilderness Society, and the Wildlife Management Institute.

Col. Paul H. Weiland, Medford, state Izaak Walton League director, has received a letter from C. R. Gutermuth, vice-president of the Wildlife Management Institute asking his help in securing local opposition to the federal proposal.
