Washington—(U.P.)—The Senate Commerce Committee called Robert Kintner, president of the American Broadcasting Company, to testify today on proposals for government regulations of television networks. Committee sources said Kintner would be questioned chiefly on ABC's competition with the National Broadcasting Company and Columbia Broadcasting System.

Effectiveness of DEW Line Against Missiles Question

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Brig. Gen. Stanley T. Wray, chief of the Air Force's electronic defense system, says America's Arctic radar net will be more than 90 per cent effective against any airplane now on the drawing boards. But its effectiveness against intercontinental missiles is still a question, he added.

French Surprise Guerrilla Band

Algiers, Algeria—(U.P.)—French forces surprised a rebel band hidden in a field of wheat apparently lying in wait for harvest workers, officials disclosed today. The French killed 20 of the "Army of Allah" band and captured 42 in a violent battle near the coastal town of Beni Saf-Guaid, 50 miles southwest of Oran. French casualties were not announced, but they were said to include several dead and wounded.
