Civil War Veteran's Condition Is 'Good'

Duluth, Minn. — (U.P.) — Walbert Woolson, 109, lone Union army survivor of the Civil War, remained in good condition at St. Luke's Hospital here Saturday.

Attendants said he was "doing fine, and had a good night's rest." They added that he is confined to his bed most of the time but remains in good spirits and is "quite perky."

Woolson is eating well and still smokes cigars in the hospital. Attendants said they had no idea when he may be released from the hospital.

Woolson, born Feb. 11, 1847 in Watertown, N. Y., was a drummer boy in the Union Army.

Policeman Shot in Chicago Trying to Stop Fleeing Man

Chicago — (U.P.) — A veteran policeman was shot and killed early Saturday during an attempt to halt a fleeing gunman in an alley on the city's south side.

The same gunman minutes earlier wounded a church deacon and a man helping him paint a church, police said. Shortly after the gun battle, police found a third man lying wounded in a nearby prairie, and identified him as the assailant.

The dead policeman was John Blythe, 45, a veteran known for his aggressive work on a number of elite investigative details. He was killed barely 30 minutes after he came on duty at midnight.

Encounter Gunman — Blythe's partner, Dan Rolewitz, said they encountered the gunman when they went to investigate a volley of shots.

Rolewitz said the man missed three shots aimed at him before dashing diagonally across a street into the alley. Blythe chased him into the alley, and Rolewitz heard more gunfire.

Blythe was found in the alley fatally wounded. Detectives believed his killer to be James Dukes, 31, a postal worker. Dukes was the man found with a bullet in his shoulder lying in a prairie.

Neither Dukes, nor two other men wounded in the gunplay was in serious condition.

The gunfire which attracted the police wounded Charles Leggett, 29, deacon of the New Mount Baptist Church, and Tom Sylvester, 25, a church member helping Leggett paint the church at night.

Entertainers' Plane Forced to Return

San Francisco — (U.P.) — A Pan American stratoclipper with 60 passengers aboard, including comedian Red Skelton and band leader Bob Crosby and their families, returned to the mainland Saturday shortly after taking off for Honolulu when engine trouble developed.

The flight, which departed from Los Angeles at 11:45 p.m. (PDT), landed at the San Francisco International Airport at 4:30 a.m. (PDT). The plane's captain decided to return when oil pressure trouble developed in the number four engine about 300 miles off the California coast.

It was decided to return to San Francisco where a spare plane was available. After breakfast at the airport, the passengers and crew boarded the second plane and departed for Honolulu at 6:30 a.m. (PDT).

Hoover Says Season Effects Crime Wave

Washington — (U.P.) — FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover warned the nation today that killers, rapists and robbers strike most often in hot weather.

The warning was given in Hoover's annual report on crime as the nation sweated in the grip of an eight-day heat wave.

The number of murders surged sharply upward from July to September last year.

Rapes and aggravated assaults both began their annual rise in July, with the strong-arm attack hitting its peak that same month. The yearly high for the

sex offense is August. In general, Hoover reported, "people, not season, cause crimes. Different seasons, however, motivate different crimes."

The FBI director cited summer as the season for crimes against the person and winter for crimes against property.

The only major crime against the person that showed a cold weather increase was negligent manslaughter, he said.

102-Year-Old Author Dies in Pennsylvania

Drexel Hill, Pa. — (U.P.) — Mrs. Frances M. Ford, 102-year-old author of the children's story, "The Little Engine That Could," died Friday at her home here.

A native of Elmira, N.Y., Mrs. Ford celebrated her 102nd birthday last March 27. When she was 19, Mrs. Ford married Frank F. Ford, who died here in 1894.

Mrs. Ford wrote her story about the little switch engine under the pseudonym of "Uncle Nat." She became generally recognized as the author of the story only in 1953, after it had been read and sold through the years without credit to the author.
