Teen-Agers Said Severest Critics Of Own Mothers

If a man's severest critic is his wife, a mother's sternest judge is her teen-age daughter. A poll of teen-age girls on what they thought of their mothers' looks, conducted recently by Mrs. Lucile D. Kirk, beauty editor of Parents' Magazine, reveals that almost to a girl they believe there is room for improvement.

One girl summed up the situation when she said, "Mother does many nice things for me, but rarely, alas, much for herself." However, the high school group were proud of their mothers' friendliness, ability to get along with others, especially their teen-age friends, cooperativeness, and their "seemingly unlimited patience, understanding, and sense of humor."

Criticism was directed at such things as sparse eyebrows and lashes, lack of eye make-up when mother went out. Said one teenager, "I guess after you get your man you don't need beauty aids any more." Other girls said they wished their mothers would use lipstick and powder not only on social outings but at home.

One young critic raved about her mother's figure, "exceptional," she said for a woman of her age, which is forty. More typically, the teens thought their mothers could afford to take off a few pounds but not by eating potato chips with low calorie soft drinks!

On the credit side, many teens praised their mothers' dress and general appearance, but some criticized their mothers' practice of wearing old clothes or shorts for doing housework, or hair in pincurlers. Their mothers allowed too much time to pass between permanents, wore the same hairdo too long, others said.

Mothers don't have to doll up for their families was the consensus but they should always look neat and attractive. One apologist felt, however, that personal beauty habits because their teen-age daughters demand too much.
