Stevenson promptly replied that he was "much pleased."
Kefauver insisted that his move has no political implications. He said he still is fighting "to win" the Democratic presidential nomination over Stevenson and other hopefuls and that his "present" position is that he would not accept the vice presidential nomination.
But Kefauver made the first move Sunday in apologizing for his personal attacks on Stevenson during their recent presidential primary battles. He said that "I got mad and lost my head" and "got somewhat out of character" in criticizing Stevenson.

Brawling Marks Introduction of New Nazi Party

Miltenberg, Germany — (U.P.) — Otto Strasser, a former confidant of Adolf Hitler, brought his new Nazi party in to the open Sunday at a found conference marked by brawling, bloodshed and rioting.
Shouting youths fired salvoes of tear gas into the conference and fought a hand to hand battle with riot police before order was restored. It was a scene in the best Nazi tradition in this old Bavarian town.
The anti-Strasser youths surged into the hotel conference room with shouts of "get down" and "give up!" as Strasser began addressing the delegates gathered here to found his new "German Social Union."
Fights broke out between the delegates and the invaders and shots were fired from gas pistols. Strasser clung to the rostrum and shouted "we will never give it up" as the fight swirled around the floor. Riot police swarmed in and broke it up.
Strasser, who spent 21 years in exile after he broke with Hitler, said the demonstration was a provocation but he did not say who organized the riot. Observers believed the demonstrators were Socialist and Communist youths from Frankfurt and Hanau.

Chrysler Strike Vote Due To Be Taken Thursday

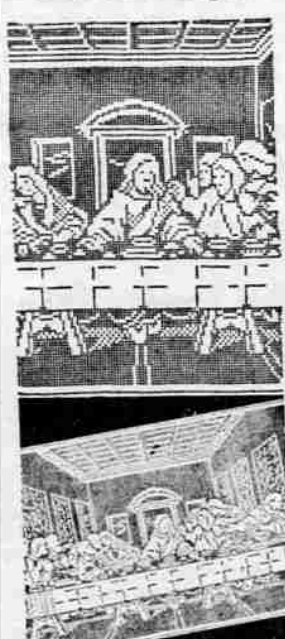
Detroit — (U.P.) — A strike vote against the Chrysler Corp., Detroit's largest single employer, will be taken Thursday by the members of the United Auto Workers Local 212.
The workers agreed at a mass meeting Sunday to authorize union officials to set up machinery for a strike vote.
The decision to take the vote stems from a 10-day dispute between Chrysler and the workers which brought six walkouts in the last seven working days and idled 14,000 workers at eight plants. If the strike is called it would idle 15,000 workers at 10 plants.
The walkouts resulted from union charges the company was trying to start a speedup. A Chrysler spokesman denied the charges and said the walkouts were "wildcat strikes."
At Sunday's meeting, Emil Mazey, UAW secretary-treasurer, and Pat Caruso, local president, both urged the workers to return to their jobs today.
The two told the men: "Go back to work and let the union handle this."

Liberace's Brother Burglary Suspect
Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Pianist Liberace's brother, Rudolph, awaited action by the district attorney's office today on a police report listing the 24-year-old film editor as a burglary suspect.
Young Liberace was booked on suspicion of burglary and released Saturday after a pre-dawn disturbance in nearby Van Nuys.
Police said he pounded on the door of a home with a rubber hose and demanded his wife who he apparently thought was inside.
The brother of the famed piano player told police he had been drinking and left home following an argument with his wife.
Officers said further action is up to the district attorney.

President Nominates Director of Mines

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower today nominated Marling J. Ankeny as director of the Bureau of Mines.
This was the first nomination recommended by the new Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton.
Ankeny, 54, worked for the bureau for 10 years as safety director before joining the Bituminous Coal Operations association in 1952.
He succeeds John J. Forbes, who has retired.

Portland Shipyard Strike Due July 1

Portland — (U.P.) — Unless a satisfactory agreement is reached, Portland shipyard workers will go out on strike July 1, E. A. Bird, secretary of the Portland Metal Trades Council, said here Saturday.
A conference, aimed at ironing out differences between workmen and employers, was scheduled to open here today. About 3000 Portland employees are covered by the disputed agreement.
Bird said that a strike vote taken was "100 per cent" in favor of walking out if an agreement was not reached.

Ike Takes First Soft Food Since Operation

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower took his first soft foods Saturday to celebrate the beginning of his second week of recovery from a major abdominal operation.
He also turned to his television set to watch the National Open golf tournament yesterday afternoon. It was the next best thing to getting out on the links himself.
The important new steps in his convalescence were announced as the President completed the first week of his recovery and looked forward to getting out of the hospital as early as next week end.

Klamath Falls Boy Injured by Bullet

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Earl Bradford, 14-year-old Klamath Falls youth, suffered a bullet wound in the leg here Saturday when a .22-caliber pistol in the hands of a companion accidentally discharged.
Bradford, with two teen-age companions, was in a car about 16 miles west of here on the Aspen lake road. A friend was holding the gun when the car struck a bump in the road, triggering the gun.

Cool Air Eases Northern Region

Cooler air relaxed the northern half of the nation east of the Rockies today in the aftermath of heavy rainfalls over Michigan, Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma.

The small town of Wauneta, Neb., was mopping up following a flash flood triggered by a four-inch downpour in less than two hours. The raging waters, five to seven feet deep, caused damage estimated as high as \$1,000,000 and forced as many as 500 persons from their homes.
There were no reports of injuries, but the waters cut off power and left a two-inch blanket of mud on the streets.
Rising water blocked several highways in Colorado and streets in Detroit suburbs. Hail the size of grapes was reported in Boulder, Colo.
Mostly sunny skies and slightly higher temperatures were enjoyed by the West Coast while scattered showers dampened other parts of the nation as far east as the Middle Atlantic Coast.

Vancouver-Portland Cannery Strike Due

Portland — (U.P.) — Union cannery workers yesterday voted to strike 12 Portland-Vancouver area plants tomorrow if their demands for a wage increase are not met.
Cliff Evanson, secretary of the local cannery-workers union said that members voted "better than three to one to strike if the berry packers don't improve their offer of 10 cents an hour increase and a pension plan for year-around employees."
The disputed agreement af-

fects some 4000 workers at plants currently at their peak of production handling incoming berries.
The union had demanded the 10 cent hourly raise, plus pension benefits, and also an additional 5 cent increase for two other categories of workers.
The first 1,500 miles of deep water cable for a trans-Atlantic telephone line were laid in the summer of 1955. A similar amount will be laid this summer.
