## McLeaish Quits as FHA Director; Denies Drinking To Excess on Job

Washington — (U.P.) — Robert McLeaish, who quit under fire as director of the Farmers Home Administration, told Senate Home investigators today he never drank "to excess" on the job.

But he conceded he often drank "with friends," including "quite a few people here on Capitol Hill." He did not identify them.

"Four or five drinks wouldn't affect me at all, spread over a long enough time," McLeaish said.

### Other Questions Due

He testified before a Senate Civil Service subcommittee investigating the agency's operations. In addition to his personal habits, the subcommittee also planned to question McLeaish about his handling of the agency and cancellation of a \$1,000,000 a year insurance contract.

McLeaish, who had told United Press Tuesday that Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson did not request his resignation, testified under oath today that Benson "strongly suggested that I resign."

"The secretary told me the situation was not good for the organization," McLeaish said. "I didn't have to resign, but he

## Southern Pacific Pays \$53,500,000 in Taxes

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Southern Pacific President D. J. Russell reported Tuesday that his firm paid more than \$53,500,000 in various taxes during 1955, or about \$100 a minute for the whole year.

He said the tax bill was about \$1,500,000 greater than in the preceding year.

The federal government got \$18,000,000 under the railroad retirement act, \$9,000,000 in income taxes and about \$1,600,000 in unemployment taxes. The balance of the bill was split up among eight states, 232 counties and 574 cities.

## Science, English Summer School Set

Summer classes in mathematics, chemistry, physics and English for high school students who have shown aptitude, ability and achievement in these fields will be conducted this summer, according to the city school office.

Those taking the courses are junior class students selected on the basis of their past grades, their attitudes toward the courses, the recommendation of their instructors, and intelligence test results. A registration fee of \$1 will be charged.

Class schedules will be arranged at the first meeting at 7:30 p.m. June 26 in Room 42 of the high school. There will be 12 evening meetings of two hours each for each section. Students will be limited to not more than two of the courses—one of the sciences, plus English. No credit or grades will be given, as the program is designed to stimulate interest and broaden their training.

Mrs. Elsie Butler will instruct the mathematics course; James Johnston physics, Ryder Berg chemistry, and Mrs. Harriett Tobin English. All are on the high school faculty.

## Boat Speed Limit Set at Hiatt Lake

Talent—The board of directors of the Talent Irrigation district announced today that a speed limit on boats operating on Hiatt lake will become effective immediately.

A 5-mile-per-hour speed limit, the board said, was deemed desirable to insure a recreational and fishing lake. The limit was imposed because of danger to other boats, such as row boats, and submerged logs.

The board said that back-wash from speeding boats has proven dangerous to people fishing from floating logs close to shore as well as to children playing at the water's edge.

The limit was imposed because the board desired to keep the lake chiefly for fishing and other recreational purposes.

## Ford Foundation Checks Mailed To Hospitals

Portland — (U.P.) — Ford Foundation checks totaling \$430,000 were mailed out to several Oregon hospitals this week, the third and final foundation distribution of funds granted by trustees last December.

The checks brought the total for the year donated by the foundation to Oregon hospitals to \$929,850. An equal sum will be given next year.

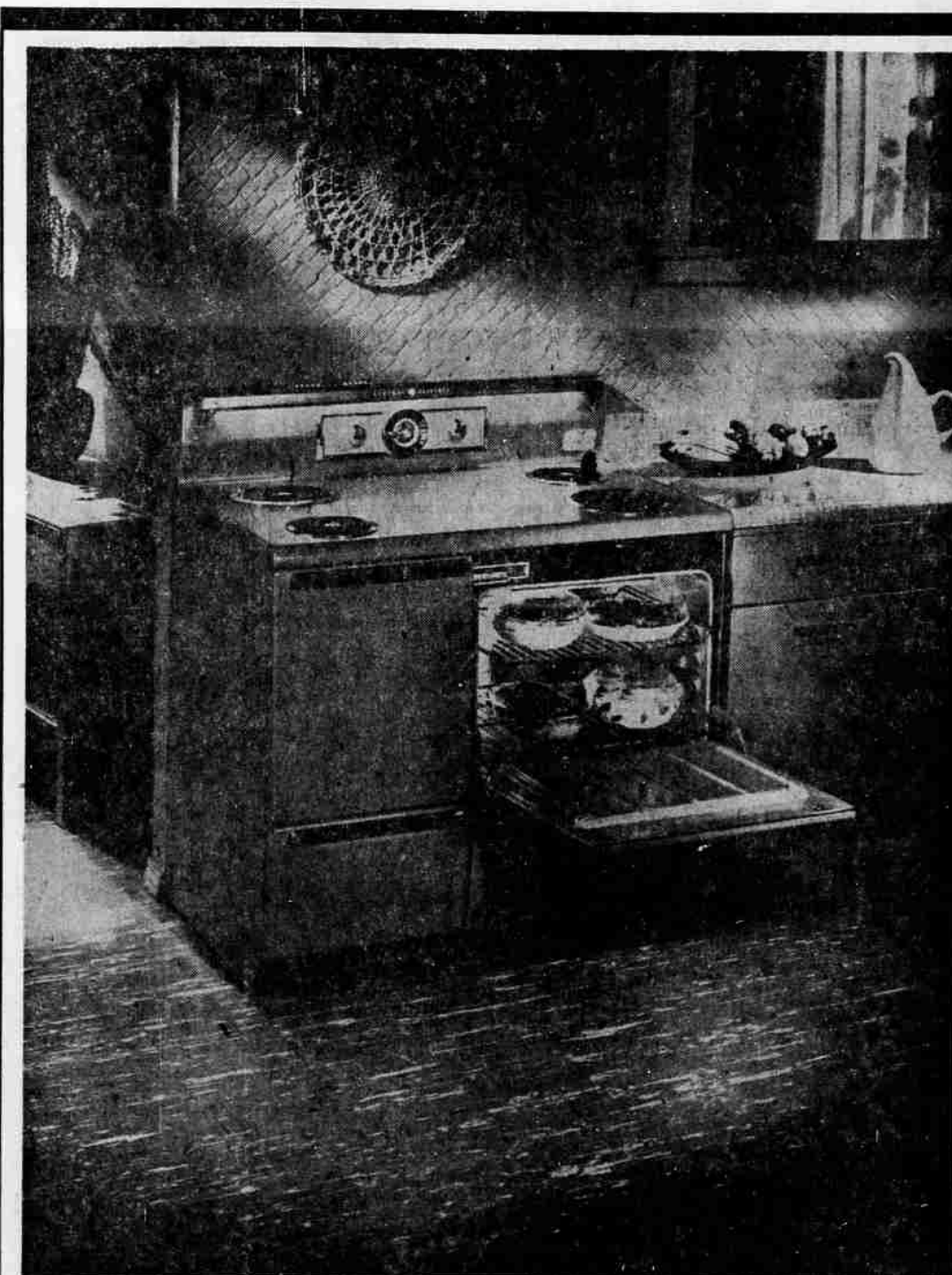

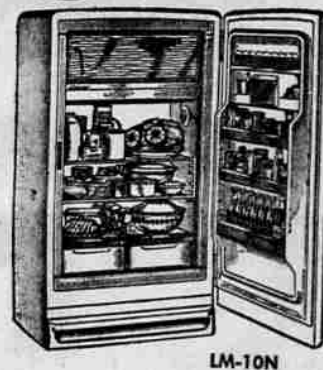

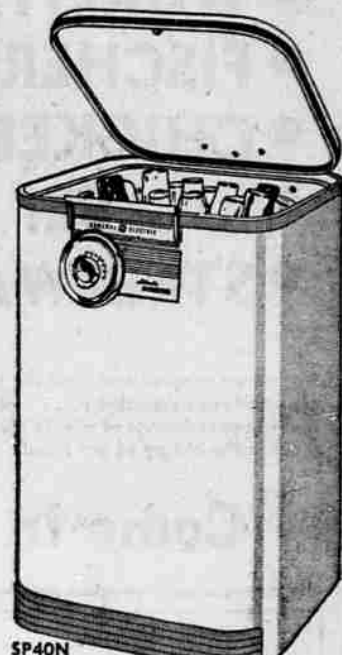
