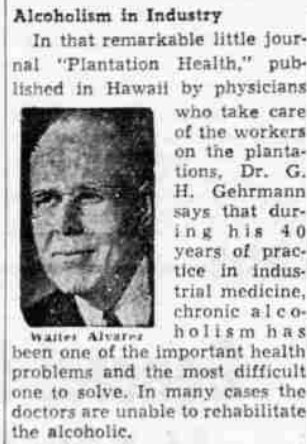

## The Medical Roundup

Alcoholism in Industry  
In that remarkable little journal "Plantation Health," published in Hawaii by physicians who take care of the workers on the plantations, Dr. G. H. Gehrman says that during his 40 years of practice in industrial medicine, chronic alcoholism has been one of the important health problems and the most difficult one to solve. In many cases the doctors are unable to rehabilitate the alcoholic.

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In that remarkable little journal "Plantation Health," published in Hawaii by physicians who take care of the workers on the plantations, Dr. G. H. Gehrman says that during his 40 years of practice in industrial medicine, chronic alcoholism has been one of the important health problems and the most difficult one to solve. In many cases the doctors are unable to rehabilitate the alcoholic.

As Dr. Gehrman says, one of the troubles in the past has been that so many persons have thought that the alcoholic is a bad man who could behave himself if he wanted to. But no, the alcoholic is sick. He is miserable and terribly unhappy—so much so that often he thinks of suicide. He is suffering from a chronic nervous disease which, if untreated, will lead to total permanent disability or death. The doctor emphasizes the importance of starting treatment early, while the man has enough will power left with which to fight his way back to health.

He says that discharging an alcoholic doesn't do much good; it simply passes the problem on to some other employer, and finally to the people of the community who have to care for the man and eventually for his dependents. The doctor reminds us that in a big company it costs some \$5,000 to train an efficient operator, and \$25,000 to train a research chemist. If the man then becomes ruined by alcohol this investment is lost.

For 28 years the DuPonts, with whom Dr. Gehrman works, pursued the old-fashioned policy of scolding the alcoholic, telling him to stop, threatening him with discharge, and then firing him. Much time, effort and money were spent on each patient, but all to no avail. The cost to the company was high and the results were nil.

Then, one day, a man came in who told the doctor that he had been an alcoholic and had been straightened out by Alcoholics

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Anonymous. He suggested that the doctor attend a few meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous and learn something about alcoholics. The doctor went and soon saw why he had been failing to help these men. Going back to his office, he hired Dave, a cured chronic alcoholic and an old member of A.A., as his special assistant. Together they went to work.

First, they planned for the education of alcoholics, and particularly the men who were beginning to slip. These men were treated as sick patients—not bad men. They needed sympathy and understanding—not criticism and intolerance. They needed to be recognized and helped early, because once alcoholism has progressed to the stage of mental deterioration, the person may be incurable.

Few men who have reached the gutter feel that they have any incentive left to try to better themselves.

What are the early signs of disease, and one that can easily destroy and kill him. He is told that he must immediately become a total abstainer and must continue so for the rest of his life. He can never drink again. He will never be safe again, but he can go straight if he wants to badly enough. He is told that he must really want to stop drinking, and he must want help, or he will surely go on down hill.

He is reminded that Alcoholics Anonymous will have nothing to do with him unless he frankly admits that he is an alcoholic and in need of help. Too often the alcoholic is the last man to admit that he is in trouble. Too often his friends fail to help him because they are reluctant to say anything to him about his disease.

If the man agrees that he needs help and says he wants it, then the doctor keeps in touch with him for at least three months. If he refuses help, or complains that he doesn't need it,
