

CAMPY WINS FOR BROOKS; SIX STRAIGHT FOR BRAVES

This is the closest National League race of the century and the Brooklyn Dodgers ought to feel mighty good about that today because they were the pennant winners back in 1947 and 1920 when the closest races up to now were staged.

The Dodgers ought to be feeling great anyhow, even if they didn't have precedent on their side. For they won what was by all odds their most important game of the season Thursday night when they poured over four runs in the ninth to subdue the cocky Cardinals, 9-8, as Roy Campanella blasted his second three-run homer of the game.

The victory put Brooklyn within half a game of the first place Milwaukee Braves. Milwaukee topped Pittsburgh 7-2 to continue a six-game victory binge that began when Fred Haney replaced Charley Grimm as manager.

But what made the crowd roar in Brooklyn was an old-time demonstration of power by old-timer Roy Campanella, who had been demoted to eighth spot in the batting order.

"Maybe we can make him mad and he'll get hot like he did last year," said Manager Walter Alston. Campy had no direct answer for that except to say that "When you've been batting as lousy as I have been, you're lucky if they keep you in the lineup—I guess I just finally ran out of 'outs' and hit a couple."

Before Roy's second homer

things looked had for Brooklyn. There were two out and Stan Musial had put St. Louis in front, 8-5, with his second homer, also a three-run job. Campy teed off on right hander Murry Dickson, who had come in expressly to pitch to him and that tied the count at 8-8. A walk to Sandy Amoros, Junior Gilliam's single and a game winning blow by Don Zimmer broke it up.

Strengthened Bend Loggers Enter League Play Against Cheney Studs Here; 3 Games

Coos Bay - North Bend rapped out a 9 to 1 victory over Coquille in a semi-pro game Wednesday night at North Bend. This gave the CB-NB team a 2 and 1 record to tie with Drain for first in league standings, and gave Coquille a 1 and 2 record to tie with the Cheney Studs for second. Batteries for the game were: CB-NB, Bonneau and Allison; Coquille, Billante and Olsen.

The Medford Cheney Studs will attempt to give the Bend Loggers a cold reception into Southern Oregon league semi-pro baseball for the year when they meet Bend for a three

game series here this weekend. All games are to be played at the fairgrounds. Starting times are 7:45 p.m. and 8 p.m. Saturday, and 2 p.m. Sunday.

Bend has not played a league game yet this season, having been the one club of the five which drew a bye in last week-end's openers.

Earlier this year the Studs beat the Loggers both games of a doubleheader. Since then, Bend has added infielder Ron Bowen and pitcher Don Donoski. Donoski huris for the University of Oregon during the school year.

The 6-foot 5-inch Bowen threw his 225 pounds into a ball Saturday and broke up the

Loggers' game with Archer Blower of Portland with a winning run. Final score was 6 to 5. Bend dropped the second encounter of a twin-bill to Archer, rated nearly the best semi-pro club in Portland, 3 to 1.

The Studs stand tied with Coquille for second in the league now. They took the Drain Black Sox for the first time in history last week and then lost the next two for a 333 percentage.

Medford will start Pitchers Jerry Droscher, Don White and either Bob Selsor or Jim Kelly in that order for the three games. Frank Roelandt, batting .417 at the head of the team presently, will take his usual place behind the plate for catching duties every game.
