

Chisox, Tribe Keep Up Pace; NY Yanks Retain Shaky Lead

The stirred-up White Sox and Indians were peppering the Yankees from both flanks today, anxiously waiting for one false move to knock the New Yorkers out of the American league lead.

The White Sox, with definite designs on first place, ran their winning streak to nine games Tuesday night with a 4-1 victory over the Red Sox while the Indians reeled off their seventh straight triumph by edging the Orioles, 4-3.

Southpaw Whitey Ford kept the wolves from the door, as it were, when he pitched the Yankees to an 8-4 victory over the Athletics, thereby enabling the Bronx Bombers to retain their shaky 1 1/2 game lead.

Harshman Trims Boxox
Jack Harshman helped the White Sox run their winning streak to the longest one in five years when he set the Red Sox down on three hits for his fifth victory. The current Chicago winning streak is the longest since the 1951 White Sox won 14 games in a row.

Tom Brewer held the White Sox to three hits in six innings but all came in the second inning when Chicago scored three runs on two singles, a walk, an error by Ted Williams and a double by Luis Aparicio.

Early Wynn recorded his eighth victory with a five-hit effort over Baltimore, the Indians breaking a 3-3 tie when Bobby Avila and Gene Woodling hit back-to-back doubles off reliever George Zuverink in the seventh. Baltimore led 3-0 until the sixth when the Tribe tied the score with a three-run rally off starter Connie Johnson.

Yankees Parade Homers
Home runs by Yogi Berra, Billy Martin and Andy Carey carried the Yankees to their victory over the Athletics. Ford gave up seven hits, including a ninth inning homer by Harry (Suittcase) Simpson. Ex-Yankee Tom Gorman was the loser.

Detroit and Washington battled to a 2-2 tie in a game limited to 4 2/3 innings by rain. The Tigers, who entered the game with a nine-game losing streak, tied the score in the bottom of the fifth off Bunky Stewart as they scored a run when Al Kaline hit into a double play with the bases full. Managers Bucky Harris of Detroit and Chuck Dressen of Washington each protested the game as a result of a play which delayed the game 15 minutes in the first inning.

The drawn-out argument that ensued revolved around whether Senator outfielder Ernie Oravetz caught Jack Phillips' long-drive before or after it hit the left field screen.

Robin Roberts, back on the beam again after a poor start, snapped the Braves' 11-game winning streak with a five-hit 4-2 victory for the Phillies. Roberts struck out seven and didn't walk a batter in evening his record at 8-8. The Phils broke a 2-2 tie in the eighth when they scored two runs on singles by Stan Lopata, Del Ennis and Elmer Valo along with an error by Bobby Thompson.

Braves' Lead Out
The defeat cut the Braves' lead in the National league to 1 1/2 games over the second-place Redlegs, who were rained out in a game with the Pirates.

Rube Walker, a last minute replacement for Roy Campanella, drove in six runs with a homer, triple and a double to pace the Dodgers to a 10-5 decision over the Cubs. Walker tripled with two on in the first inning, homered with one on in the sixth to break a 4-4 tie and wrapped the game up with a two-run double in the seventh to insure Sal Maglie's second victory. Jackie Robinson clouted a pair of homers for Brooklyn and Gene Baker and Walt Moryn each homered for Chicago.

Ruben Gomez limited the Cardinals to three infield hits in pitching the Giants to a 3-0 victory. Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell was the loser although he didn't give up a hit. He started for St. Louis and walked the first three batters he faced. Larry Jackson relieved him and Bobby Hofman hit into a double play, sending one run across while Bill Sarni followed with a single for another run.

New York—(U.P.)—If Jim Wilson pitches the White Sox to the American league pennant—and he's making a mighty fine try—the Yankees will kick themselves all over the lot for passing up an opportunity to get him this winter.

Since obtaining the 34-year-old soft-throwing Wilson from the Orioles on May 21, the White Sox have cut the Yankees' lead by five games and Wilson has picked off six victories to bring his record to 10-3.

Throughout most of last winter the Yankees dickered with the Orioles, expressing an interest in Baltimore pitchers Bill Wight, Ray Moore and Wilson. First the Yankees were interested in Wight, then Wilson and for a time in Moore.

Orioles Asked Bids
Oriole officials indicated they were open for bids and the Yankees listed such player as second baseman Gerry Coleman and pitcher Tom Morgan as available.

The Orioles held out for still another Yankee player and while negotiations were going on, the Bronx Bombers lost interest in obtaining Wight because he got off to a poor start. So the Yankees focused their attention on Wilson and Moore but finally decided neither of them was worth what the Orioles were asking.

Wilson's brilliant showing with the White Sox so far must come as a particularly annoying boomerang to the Yankees, especially in view of the poor pitching they have been getting from Bob Turley and Mickey McDermott, two hurlers they went all-out to obtain from other clubs.

No Chance Without Him
When the White Sox acquired Wilson from the Orioles, Chicago Manager Marty Marion said: "Without a pitcher like Wilson we didn't have a chance to win the pennant but now that we've got him, I honestly think we can win it all."

The Yankees viewed Wilson's transfer from Baltimore to Chicago without undue alarm; certainly they never felt the ex-Milwaukee righthander could possibly make all that difference to the White Sox pennant chances.

Wilson has had to wait a long time for stardom to beckon. In 1945 he was almost killed by a line drive off Hank Greenberg's bat. As he lay in his hospital bed he debated whether to return to baseball and he admits now he considered giving it up.

close games, opened not only the eyes of the Yankees but the eyes of a number of other clubs as well. Several times during the past winter the Orioles had inquiries about Wilson from various American league clubs but no deal for him was consummated until last month.

And from the looks of things, the Yankee pitching might not be so much at sea today had not the Bronx Bombers missed the boat on Wilson.

Oregon Wildlife Work Receives Federal Boost

Portland — Oregon's wildlife program will get an additional boost of \$66,443.73 in restoration funds in 1956 for a whopping total of \$355,429.13, the Oregon Game Commission has reported.

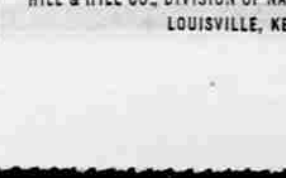
The \$66,443 is Oregon's share in the first apportionment of the accumulated backlog of more than \$13,000,000 dollars of federal aid for wildlife funds. This huge reserve accumulated from 1939 to 1946 when congress did not appropriate the full receipts annually from the 11 per cent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition. The appropriation of this backlog was authorized by the passage of the Bible-Boykin bill in 1955 and a supplemental bill in 1956 apportioning to the states 20 per cent of the reserve annually until the reserve is exhausted.

Oregon's regular portion for 1956 in federal aid in wildlife funds under the Pittman-Robertson Act amounted to \$288,985.41. Matching funds are required for both the reserve funds and regular apportionment on the same basis as in the past — \$1 of state funds for each \$3 of federal funds.

Medford-CP also picked up a tally in the second stanza and broke even with Roseburg during the rest of the fracas.

Oerding Shines
Dick Smith and Oerding combined for a four-hit mound job for the victors. The hits were off Smith in 4 2-3 innings. Oerding tossed the last 2-1-3. Roseburg got 12 hits off Allen in six innings and one off Ernie Tyler in the seventh.

Oerding was the batting star of the evening with his triple, two doubles and a single in five trips to the plate. Beamer smashed three line singles in four times up and Kinney and Lindbloom slugged two for four. Larry Perkins doubled and singled for Medford in four batting turns.

Rogue Valley girls' softball team outclubbed Dunsuir 17 to 9 and smothered Weed 24 to 0 last night in games at Dunsuir.

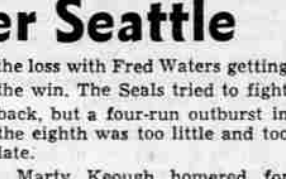
