Permits for Open Burning To Stop

The Jacksonville fire department has announced that no more permits for open burning will be issued in the city starting July 1.

The department said open grass fires will be in violation of the city ordinance and all trash fires must be in properly screened incinerators. Seasonal permits for incinerators can be obtained at Chris's Drugs. Incinerators are liable for inspection at any time, the department reminded residents.

Permit holders must have sufficient garden hose available while burning, must not build too large a fire, and must do all burning between 8 a. m. and noon.

Holder of permits are responsible for damage from fire if it should spread to surrounding areas and any permits may be revoked if requirements are not met.

Grace, Prince Plan US Visit in Autumn

New York — (U.P.) — Prince Rainier and his princess, the former Grace Kelly, plan to visit America in the autumn, the U.S. consul-general to Monaco said today.

The consul - general, G. Van Barkaloo Hale, Santa Barbara, Calif., said on returning from Monaco that he and his wife had lunched with the Prince and Grace two days before leaving.

"They told us they definitely will visit the United States this autumn," said Hale. "They are very happy together, and the people of the principality are happy with them."

Hale was asked about reports that Grace is going to have a baby, but said he knew nothing about it.

Ike Once Gave Long Thought To Forming New Party, Book Reveals

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower once became so angered over the actions of right-wing Republicans that he gave "prolonged thought" to the idea of heading a new political party, a just-published book reports.

The President dropped the idea finally, but his dissatisfaction with the same elements of the party played a major role in his decision to run for a second term, the book says.

The book is "Eisenhower: The Inside Story," by Robert J. Donovan. White House correspondent for the New York Herald Tribune. It already is the center of a controversy.

The book is filled with accounts never before made available for publication of what went on at closed cabinet, legislative and other executive conferences held during Mr. Eisenhower's first three years as president. These secret accounts were furnished to Donovan by the White House.

Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) has demanded that the White House explain why Donovan was given secret documents from executive files when the administration has refused to make similar documents available to congressional committees for use in investigations.

Maxwell Rabb, secretary to the cabinet, this week rejected an invitation to explain this to McClellan's Senate investigating subcommittee. Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) has called for contempt action against Rabb.

Other highlights of the book: Mr. Eisenhower on Jan. 13 of this year called in 12 of his closest associates to discuss whether he should run for a second term. They unanimously said he should.

The factors which decided the President in favor of a second term attempt were his disappointment over "reformation" of the Republican party, his interest in world peace, his belief that he had "somehow got through to Soviet leaders" at the Geneva Summit meeting and his utter boredom while convalescing from his heart attack.

Mrs. Eisenhower was at first "dead set against" a second term in view of the President's heart attack, but apparently came to believe a little later that "her husband was not ready for retirement."

The tactics used by Sen. McCarthy "disgusted and infuriated" the President and would cause him to "go up in an utter blaze." When pressed by associates to give McCarthy "both barrels," the President told his staff in late 1953 that "I will not get in the gutter with that guy."

Four months later the President said at a cabinet meeting that the "bad thing about McCarthy is that he is impeding this work" against subversion. Donovan said the President then said "but more in jest than seriously, it might be a good idea for the Kremlin to put McCarthy on its payroll."

The late Sen. Robert A. Taft "went off like a bomb" when Mr. Eisenhower and his cabinet aides told an April 30, 1953, legislative conference that heavy military spending would continue; that more deficits lay ahead, and "that the first Republican budget would be out of balance."

The President was "taken aback" and "stunned" when Taft declared lack of confidence in the U. S. joint chiefs of staff, predicted a Democratic victory in the '54 elections if the budget were not changed, and then said to the President, "Now you're taking us right down the same road Truman travelled."

Although "tempted" to make a heated reply, Mr. Eisenhower quietly outlined certain essential elements in U. S. global strategy and added that "they are not difficult to understand."

Donovan said that those attending the meeting at which Mr. Eisenhower asked for advice on the second term included Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr., Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey, and Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield. Others sitting in the circle included U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., Maj. Gen. Wilton B. Persons, Tom Stevens, and James C. Hagerty, GOP National Chairman Leonard W. Hall and the President's brother, Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower.

Oregon Car Pool Cost Said 4.5 Cents a Mile

Salem — (U.P.) — Cost of operating Oregon's 160-car motor pool here was about 4.5 cents per mile last year for each car, the State Finance Department said today. This was a reduction of 7 of a cent per mile over the previous year.

"Preventive maintenance and pooling of vehicles" were credited with the lower cost. A few years ago departments using pool cars were charged six cents a mile.

It was estimated the savings last year totaled \$25,000. Preventive maintenance involved a grease job every 1000 miles, a change of oil every 2000 miles, a check for possible mechanical difficulties with every lubrication and complete mechanical inspections every 10,000 miles.

Animal Laboratory Bids Presented

St. Louis — (U.P.) — Delegations from 32 states today resumed presentation of their bids for a \$18,915,000 animal disease laboratory planned by the Department of Agriculture.

A special USDA committee is conducting a four-day hearing, to end Saturday, for colleges and cities seeking the laboratory.

The 10-member committee plans to narrow the bids of the 67 delegations to about a half-dozen, then make on the spot inspections of these.

The University of Missouri and the St. Louis Area Chamber of Commerce were among the delegations making strong pleas for the laboratory Wednesday.
