

# Covington Provides Crucial Hit For Braves; NY Lead Cut

The Milwaukee Braves snapped a three-game losing streak and took a one-game grip on first place in the National League today when they defeated the Chicago Cubs, 4-3, on the wings of Wes Covington's three-run homer.

Covington's blow came in the sixth inning after a walk to Frank Torre and a single by Hank Aaron and dealt Sam Jones his sixth defeat of the year. Gene Conley, the Braves' 6-foot, 8-inch right-hander, went the route to win his fourth game. Ernie Banks hit his 18th homer for the Cubs.

The victory, 12th in 15 games under Fred Haney's stewardship, put the Braves one full game ahead of the Cincinnati Redlegs and Brooklyn Dodgers, who went into a tie for second place. The Redlegs suffered a 5-2 loss to the St. Louis Cardinals today while the Dodgers kayced Robin Roberts and went on to beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 10-7.

The Cardinals, beating the Redlegs for the second straight game, scored five runs off Hal Jeffcoat in 4 2/3 innings. Murry Dickson received credit for his fifth victory although he needed ninth-inning help from Jim Konstanty. The Cardinals wrapped it up with a four-run fifth inning featured by Ken Boyer's two-run single.

The Dodgers ripped into Roberts, who lost his ninth decision, for five runs in the third inning and went on to pile up 15 hits, including Gil Hodges' 16th homer, a triple and double by Randy Jackson and doubles by Jim Gilliam and Duke Snider. Carl Erskine received credit for his fifth win.

Rookie shortstop Ed Bresnold's two-run triple was the key blow in a four-run second inning outburst that enabled the New York Giants to down the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-4, in the other National League game. Ruben Gomez won his fourth game for the Giants while Ronnie Kline suffered his eighth defeat. The loss was the Pirates' 12th in 14 games.

In the American League, the seventh-place Washington Senators came up with a 5-1 triumph over the New York Yankees, whose first place lead was cut to two games when the Chicago White Sox beat the Cleveland Indians, 8-3.

Jim Lemon bashed a three-run homer in the first inning and Chuck Stobbs came through with an eight-hitter as the Senators handed Johnny Kucks his fourth loss against 10 victories. The Yankees' run came in the seventh on two singles and Bob Cerv's sacrifice fly.

National league castoff Gerry Staley yielded 12 hits but hung on to his third game behind an 11-hit attack that included Larry Doby's first homer against his former teammates. Don Mossi, making his second start of the season, was routed and charged with his second loss.

Rounding out A.L. activity, Boston was at Baltimore for a two-night doubleheader and Detroit played a single game against Kansas City.

# Richardson, Seixas Nab Net Clashes

Wimbledon, England — (U.P.)—Vic Seixas of Philadelphia and Ham Richardson of Westfield, N. J., reached the men's singles quarter-finals of the Wimbledon Tennis Tournament Saturday, but Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., was eliminated in the fourth round.

Seixas, who won the Wimbledon crown three years ago, advanced to the round of eight survivors with a 6-2, 6-1, 8-6 victory over Gordon Forbes of South Africa. Richardson, the Yank at Odford, moved up when Abe Segal of South Africa retired after losing the first set, 7-5. Richardson is seeded sixth and Seixas eighth.

Larsen was knocked out of the tournament by Ken Rosewall of Australia, the second-seeded men's singles entry, 7-5, 7-5, 6-3.

The four seeded U.S. women's entries all advanced to the quarterfinals. Top-seeded Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., trounced Fay Muller of Australia, 6-3, 6-1; second-seeded Beverly Baker Feitz of Los Angeles eliminated Zuzi Kormoczi of Hungary, 6-0, 8-6; fourth-seeded Althea Gibson of New York defeated Pat Hird of England, 6-0, 6-4; and fifth-seeded Shirley Fry of St. Petersburg, Fla., beat Jennifer Hoad of Australia, 6-2, 6-2.

# 'Flying Jinx' Lands After Engine Trouble

San Francisco — (U.P.)—A four-engine Pan American Clipper, with Pan Am's "flying jinx" comedian Red Skelton and 55 other passengers aboard, landed here Saturday after flying the last 600 miles from Honolulu on three engines.

It was the second time in two weeks that Skelton arrived at the San Francisco International Airport on a "wing and a quip."

Like his first performance two weeks ago, when his plane was forced to return with engine trouble shortly after take off for Honolulu, the red haired comic kept his fellow passengers amused with his antics and remarks. Shortly after 9 o'clock this morning, plane Capt. William Thomas radioed San Francisco that he was having trouble with one engine and was routinely "feathering" it—in other words, turning off the bad engine.

As a "precaution," the Coast Guard dispatched an amphibian patrol plane to escort the clipper.

# Fred Hutchinson Fined, Suspended By Prexy Giles

St. Louis — (U.P.)—Manager Fred Hutchinson of the St. Louis Cardinals was fined \$150 and suspended for three days Saturday in connection with a dispute with Umpire Babe Pinelli in Friday night's game with the Cincinnati Redlegs.

National League President Warren Giles said the penalty, effective immediately, was for "remarks made to Pinelli and intentional body contact."

The order originally called for a four-day suspension but was reduced to three days after Hutchinson and General Manager Frank Lane made what they called "strong protests."

Hutchinson denied any bodily contact with the umpire. He said he was standing in front of Pinelli and "he tried to walk through me."

The Cards manager was chased from the park by Pinelli during the argument over the umpire's decision which resulted in a shower of paper cups from the stands.

The incident arose in the seventh inning when Cardinal outfielder Bobby Del Greco hit a looping ball to the left field bleacher wall which was caught by a fan.

Hutchinson ran out to Pinelli and claimed it should be a home run since the fan had not leaned over the wall to catch it. Pinelli ruled it was a two-base hit.

# Top Policy Maker Leaves Conference

San Francisco — (U.P.)—An official of the National Association for the Advancement of the Colored People revealed Saturday that top NAACP policy maker Thurgood Marshall walked out on a committee meeting but denied Marshall was quitting the association.

Questioned about a report that Marshall stomped from a meeting of the resolutions committee last night and told bystanders that he was "quitting" the NAACP, Executive Secretary Roy Wilkins admitted there had been an argument and that Marshall did leave.

However, he said that he believed a statement that Marshall was through with the association was in error.

"Marshall made no such statement to me, to the board of directors or any portion of the convention," Wilkins said.

He said that Marshall, who also is chief counsel for the NAACP, had told a resolutions committee member that he was "quitting" his seat on the committee.

Wilkins said the dispute took place between Marshall and several delegates, primarily from New York, in the resolutions committee when the delegates insisted on an anti-segregation housing resolution Marshall felt was too strong.

Marshall was not available to confirm or deny the "quitting" reports, as he flew out of here early Saturday for Denver, where he is to address the Links Club, a woman's organization.

# Plan to Block Rate Boost Said 'Giveaway'

Washington — (U.P.)—Rep. Craig Hosmer (R-Calif) Saturday labeled as a "giveaway" as Democratic-backed plan to block a rate boost for Public Power customers of the Southwestern Power Administration.

Hosmer said the power is now being sold to REA co-operatives and other public power groups at a loss. He said the loss "would come out of the general treasury or the pockets of future users."

"We've got a giveaway situation here," he told a House Interior subcommittee.

Assistant Interior Secretary Fred G. Aandahl said unless Southwestern Power Administration increases its rates to co-ops, it will take 78 to 100 years to pay off the cost of the big public power project.
