Miss Lois Kelley will be one of 29 Oregon delegates to the 1956 national convention of Future Homemakers of America. The convention will be held July 2-8 at the Conrad Hilton hotel in Chicago, Ill. Miss Kelley is being partially sponsored by the Griffin Creek Grange.
