Add Boiling Water, Steak Ready To Eat

Davis, Calif. —(U.P.)— They now are at work on a steak which you cook by just pouring boiling water on it.

The process of pre-cooking steaks before freeze-drying them is being studied by Aloys L. Tappel, assistant professor of food technology at the University of California research labs here.

He already has successfully produced uncooked freeze-dried meat that can keep for long periods in air-tight containers. These products can be cooked after

soaking them in water for a few minutes.

Beefsteaks, chops, and small roasts, pork chops, chicken and fish have been freeze-dried. The Army, which would be the largest user of such foods, this year is planning large-scale tests with uncooked freeze-dried meat which will be cooked in the field.

The idea is a pre-cooked freeze-dried meat to be packaged on a disposable plate, sealed in plastic and shipped without storage anywhere in the world.

Specialist Gives Tips About Disposal Units

Urbana, Ill. —(U.P.)— Food waste disposal units are great time-savers, but they can also be a big headache unless you check certain points before buying one, says Catherine M. Sullivan, University of Illinois home management specialist.

Miss Sullivan suggests this checklist:

Be certain city regulations in your community don't prohibit disposal units.

Have a septic tank with a capacity of more than 500 gallons. Get a sink drain that will accommodate a disposal unit. Usually a 3 1/2 or 4 inch drain is required.

Make sure you have a good supply of cold water since it must run constantly while the disposal unit is running.

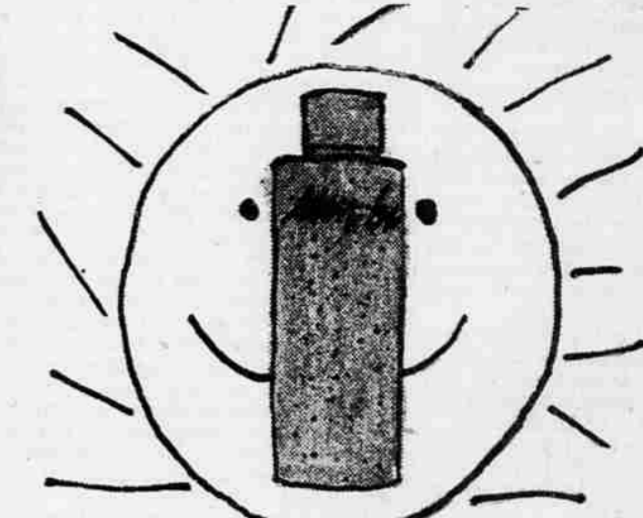
