Hearing Aids For Infants

I just heard from Mrs. Raymond Lively, of the Hear Foundation, Los Angeles. She was impressed by my recent column on the need for putting artificial arms and legs on small children who were born without an arm or leg. She says that the Hear Foundation feels that deaf infants should quickly be fitted with hearing aids, if it is at all possible for the apparatus to help them. As she says so wisely, it is very hard for a child's brain to develop unless it is constantly in contact with the world round about. Not to be hearing thousands of sounds during the first few years of life is to be deprived of countless psychological and emotional experiences. Later, it may be hard to regain the ground lost.

The deaf child is bound to have trouble learning to speak, and it certainly will have great difficulty in acquiring a good vocabulary. Just imagine a child growing up in a void, emotionally detached from his family, loving the joy of hearing the loving accents of his mother's voice, and without laughter and music.

Several Progress Quickly

The youngest child to get a hearing aid was fitted at the Hear Foundation when he was four months old. With such an aid, several of the children progressed quickly from no speech at all to a normal vocabulary for their age. Every deaf child who has had a hearing aid for a year has started to talk.

As soon as the child gets his aid, his behavior and personality change for the better. He is easier to handle. He is happy because, at last, he is part of the world about him. Just as in the case of the armless child who insists on wearing his artificial arm to bed, these children love their hearing aid and want to wear it throughout all of their waking hours. They want to keep it on even when in bed. As long as they are awake they do not want to miss anything that is going on!

Many of the children use an aid in each ear so that they can locate whence sounds come, just as normal persons do.

Dr. Alvarez hopes his readers will understand that it would be impossible for him to answer requests for information or to attempt to diagnose by mail.

Fire Levels Store, Hotel at Eugene

Eugene—(U.P.)—Fire early today destroyed the John Warren hardware building and a small hotel located upstairs with loss estimated at several hundred thousand dollars.

No serious injuries were reported.

The building was located on Willamette street, Eugene's main thoroughfare. Formerly the hardware store was known as the R. A. Baab company and later was sold to ex-major league baseball player Joe Gordon. It is now owned by John Warren, ex-University of Oregon basketball coach.

Eugene Policeman Dean Greenwood said the fire apparently started in a trash can in the alley behind the store. He said he saw the flames from the trash can licking up the back of the building. He pushed the can away and called the fire department as the blaze had gone too far for him to control.

Occupants of the Smeed hotel, located upstairs, were evacuated safely. Smoke damage was reported in the Tiffany-Davis drug store next door and to offices in the Tiffany building above the store.

An insurance man estimated that loss of stock of the hardware store alone would run to \$125,000.

Nixon En Route To Philippines

Honolulu—(U.P.)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon left today for the Philippines where he promised to make a major announcement on relations between the United States and the Far East.

The vice president is making a 10-day round the world goodwill tour. He arrived here Sunday from Miami.

"My speech in Manila will be a major announcement on the whole subject of the Asian picture," he told newsmen. He declined to elaborate.

Nixon also disclosed he is broadening his Asia tour to include two or more visits with other nations who "are our friends." He did not say which nations besides the Philippines and Indochina he is visiting.

Accompanying Nixon on his global flight were his wife, Pat, and Los Angeles Times Columnist Bill Henry, who is serving as his special assistant.

According to the tentative itinerary, Nixon will stay in Manila Tuesday and Wednesday. He is carrying President Eisenhower's greetings to the Philippine people who are observing the 10th anniversary of their independence July 4.

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National Education Association Convenes

Portland, Ore.—(U.P.)—The 94th annual convention of the National Education Association opened today with more than 10,000 teachers, school administrators and guests on hand for the five-day session.

The first departmental meetings were scheduled to get underway this morning. A general assembly was slated for 8 p.m. tonight.

Eric Johnson, special roving ambassador to the Middle East and head of the Motion Picture Association of America, will address the general assembly tonight.

Dozens of topics will come before the five-day meeting but none appeared more controversial than that of segregation in the nation's public schools.

New Plywood Plant Slated at Rainier

Rainier, Ore.—(U.P.)—Plans for a new plywood lay-up plant here ultimately employing between 160 and 190 men were disclosed yesterday by Joe F. Walker, Rainier attorney.

Walker said articles of incorporation have been filed and a charter issued. Stock amounting to \$740,000 will be issued, he said.

The organizing group has taken an option on a site for the proposed plant but construction will be delayed until a substantial share of the stock has been sold.

Boy Survives Fall Down Elevator Shaft

Portland—(U.P.)—A 14-year-old Waterloo, Iowa boy fell three floors down a hotel freight elevator shaft here yesterday afternoon and escaped with only a fractured elbow and wrist.

The youth, Paul Lamson, was in-Portland with his family on a vacation trip.

Hotel authorities said they could not figure out how the accident occurred. Presumably the lad had opened the freight door thinking it led to a stairway and had plunged down to the top of the elevator.

The boy had been on the seventh floor. He plunged down to the top of the elevator which had stopped at the fourth floor to pick up linen.

The impact of his fall caved in the top of the elevator.

Hospital attendants described his condition as good but said they were unsure when the boy would be released.
