American Communists Make Use Of Last Fund for Republic Report

By LYLE C. WILSON United Press Correspondent Washington — (UP) — American Communists are trying to use the latest report of the Fund for the Republic to make the United States a little safer for fellow travelers.

The fund has just reported on a moving picture and television black list of show people who are believed to be Communists or Communist sympathizers.



"The Worker," a Communist newspaper published in New York, says in its current issue that the "TV and movie industries are 'hag-ridden' by fear, and continues: 'The 600-page fund report reveals that from Hollywood to Madison ave., the smog of suspicion penetrates to all corners of the offices and stages of the movie and radio world.'"

However that may be, the Communist leaders in behalf of fellow travelers and party members avoid any factual reference about how all of this came about. The curtain rose in October, 1947, when the House Committee on Un-American Activities began an inquiry into the infiltration of the moving picture industry by Communists.

Producers Jack L. Warner, Sam Wood and Louis B. Mayer testified to the presence and activity in the industry of Communists, fellow travelers or un-American persons. Actor Adolph Menjou supported their testimony in general.

John Charles Moffitt, Esquire film critic, testified that 44 of 100 plays produced on Broadway during 1936-44 used "material to further the Communist Party line." The late Rupert Hughes named John Howard Lawson as the man who was trying to convert the Screen Writers Guild into "an instrument of Communist power."

From this beginning came the investigation of a parcel of movie people who came to be known as "the Hollywood ten." Lawson was No. 1 in all respects with a party line and Communist front record as long as your arm. Moffitt told the committee Lawson had been sent to Hollywood years before by the Communist Party to organize the movies.

The committee had spotted Lawson back there in 1944, and in a report on revolutionary theater operations, it had said this about Communist penetration: "The first manifestation, the Workers Drama League, was founded in 1926 in New York. Among its chief sponsors were Michael Gold, Daily Worker columnist, and John Howard Lawson, whose opinions have been frankly proclaimed as follows: 'As for myself, I do not hesitate to say that it was my aim to present the Communist position.'"

Lawson and his nine Hollywood friends refused to answer committee questions. Their employers fired them. They were indicted on charges of contempt of Congress and, finally, served
