

Move Made To Block Booklet Publication

Portland — (U.P.) — The Rev. Mark Chamberlain, Gresham, said today that telegrams had been sent to the Oregon Democratic convention delegation asking their help in blocking publication of a Senate booklet listing an Oregon organization as a Communist front.

The Rev. Chamberlain said the Oregon Federation for Social Action may go to the Supreme Court to test legality of the Senate's action in including the Federation in its list of Communist front organizations.

His telegram to Sens. Richard Neuberger and Wayne Morse and to Rep. Edith Green lists four reasons why the booklet should not be published.

The Senate Tuesday approved 75,000 additional copies of the publication.
