

Kiwanis Clubs Turr In Greatest Record Of Service in '55

The 4,200 clubs of Kiwanis International in the United States and Canada turned in their greatest record of community service in 1955.

That was the statement of I. A. Mirick, president of the Medford club, in reporting the activity figures for the year from the Kiwanis general office in Chicago.

Last year, Kiwanians participated in activities ranging from the purchase of an artificial eye for an underprivileged child to attracting a new industry to a community. The eight fields of principal participation are agriculture and conservation; public and business affairs; support of churches in their spiritual aims; boys and girls work; Key Clubs; Circle K clubs; underprivileged child; and vocational guidance.

Contributions Listed
Though fund raising is a minor part of their operation, they collected \$5,844,371.81 in 1955, which they contributed to youth services of various kinds. They raised \$4,296,300.60 for hospitals and hospital facilities; they contributed \$1,508,121.20 to needy churches; and they distributed \$243,046.97 to deserving students through scholarship loans.

Always interested in children, they provided treatment for 143,854 of them in dental clinics; they assisted 14,229 delinquents; and they gave clothing to 79,214 youngsters whose parents could not provide it for them.

Kiwanis also sponsored 13,406 safety patrols; provided recreational facilities for 790,762 boys and girls; and sponsored 9,162 baseball teams last year.

Under the vocational guidance program, they aided 485,136 youngsters in their search for proper occupations; they aided 35,614 more through "Work experience programs"; and they counseled 38,954 veterans.

Resurfacing Main Runway to Start

Central Heating company of Eugene will complete resurfacing of the main runway at the Medford airport starting Tuesday, according to Vern Thorpe, director of public works.

About 3,580 feet of runway was resurfaced last year but the operation was not completed because of insufficient funds in the CAA federal aid program account, Thorpe said. About 1,820 feet of runway remains to be resurfaced, he said.

The contract was awarded to Central Heating company about a month ago on a bid of \$41,195.50.

The project should be completed in five or six days, Thorpe said. During the operation the main runway will be closed and air traffic will use the cross runway, he added.

Monday the Central Heating company will pave South Ivy st. from Holmes ave. to Garfield ave. in the Garfield subdivision area. Edward Stevens, 3872 South Pacific highway, who sold 32 lots in the Garfield subdivision area, is financing the paving and sewer and water main installation in that area.
