

# Meeting of PCC Pexies Sought To Lift Gridder Ineligibilities

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—University of Southern California President Fred D. Fagg Jr., today urged that a meeting of Pacific Coast Conference presidents be called within two weeks to lift all football ineligibility actions against athletes pending formation of a new PCC code on aid to players.

Fagg Tuesday requested that the meeting be called in a telegram to President Robert Gordon Sproul of California, chairman of the president's council. The request came as many Southern Californians demanded that both USC and UCLA withdraw from the conference.

The Trojans were slapped over the weekend with fines of \$63,400 and loss of a year's eligibility for 42 football players as well as being banned from post-season bowl games for two years. Earlier UCLA also was handed stiff penalties for alleged "under the table" payments to athletes.

Directives Not Followed

Fagg charged in the telegram that the action of the faculty representatives in a meeting at Berkeley didn't follow the directives of the presidents. He said the college presidents at their June 18 meeting had told the faculty representatives to review their penalties against PCC schools with a view towards correcting any possible inequalities.

When informed of the request, Chancellor Raymond B. Allen of UCLA declared: "I fully en-

dorse and strongly concur in the sentiments expressed in Dr. Fagg's telegram."

The PCC's action against USC and UCLA has caused feelings to run high in the Los Angeles area and one newspaper, the Herald Express, ran a ballot asking readers to vote on whether the two schools should remain or withdraw from the conference. The paper reported that the balloting was 200 to 1 in favor of withdrawal on early returns.

## Mounties Blast Suds; Angels Slip In Front

Two slim percentage points separated the league-leading Seattle Rainiers and the homer happy Los Angeles Angels today after last-place Vancouver put on their mightiest display of power of the season to shove a game off the Rainiers lead Tuesday night.

The lowly Mounties blasted 17 hits and Bob Harrison scattered nine blows to coast in with a 13-0 shutout. Seattle's loss, coupled with the Angels' come from behind 6-3 win over Portland moved the Cherubs a game in front in the win column. But the Rainiers have lost one less game and lead by 606 to 604.

The Mounties got their runs in two big clusters, six in the sixth frame and five in the eighth when Ron Jackson blasted a three run homer. Jackson also poked two doubles to lead the Vancouver attack, along with Jim Pisoni who homered and singled to drive in four runs.

Jackson's blast, a mighty poke, shot over the wall in dead center field, 450 feet from the plate.

## Landy Gives Impressions Of America

United Press Sports Writer Melbourne, Australia—(U.P.)—Although expenses in some cases paid to traveling athletes have been very high, John Landy gained the impression that "there is no professionalism in athletics in America."

Landy's comments on professionalism were among several subjects the champion miler discussed in a survey of his recent American tour.

He said the Wes Santee case has stirred up a great deal of controversy in the United States, and many people feel he was

victimized. They are quick to point out, Landy said, that Russia has solved the problem easily enough.

"There you can't be declared a professional since there is no such thing as a professional sportsman. All sportsmen and women there are aided by the state," he said.

The Victorian schoolteacher added "The concept of amateurism must be very elastic to include at one and the same time, the Australian athlete who pays his own fare to the Australian national championships and the Russian who draws an officer's pay but spends his time in training camps."

Other Observations

Some of Landy's other observations:

Australia: "Most Americans don't know a great deal about our country apart from capital cities and our general position

on the globe."

Olympic visitors: "Most Americans won't come just to see the games. They'll want to have a look at Australia and meet its people."

Accommodations: "Billieing Americans in private Melbourne homes is splendid idea. Americans will like our home life—though our hotels, apart from a select few, won't be able to give them the first class service they expect."

New York: "The great concentration of people, wealth and buildings on Manhattan island fascinated me. But I would agree with the general dictum that it's a nice place to visit, but that I wouldn't like to live there."

Running tracks: "I found the tracks at Fresno and Los Angeles fast but hard, better for sprinting than for distance running. But one gets used to them in time."

In the following dispatch he tells in his own words how it felt.)

Washington—(U.P.)—Every ball player likes his base hits and I'm no exception, but the two biggest kicks I got were the home runs hit by Willie Mays and Stan Musial.

Our skipper, Walt Alton, says Willie Mays' fourth inning homer is the blow that gave us our start. I was on first base at the time, and man, I'll tell you that ball sure looked good disappearing into the left field seats.

I was in the on-deck circle when Stan connected in the seventh. I had a hunch it was going all the way when it left his bat. He and I are flying back to St. Louis tonight and that homer of his is going to make the trip real pleasant. You like to talk about those things.

Me? Well I was tickled pink even to be voted into the All-Star game. The rest was all gravy.

I'm glad my three singles had a small part in the National league's victory and I imagine the only thing that will ever make me feel any happier is playing in a World Series with the Cardinals.

Sort of Lucky

About those two plays I made in the field, well, in the first inning when I made a diving catch on Harvey Kuenn's liner, I was playing in quite a bit because I was half-looking for a bunt. So I was sort of lucky to grab the ball.

Kuenn's probably a little mad at me because of that stop I made on him again in the fifth. I know how he feels about losing a base hit.

There was only one disappointment in the game as far as I was concerned. I'd heard so much about Herb Score of Cleveland that I was looking forward to hitting against him. I never got the chance, though.

## Carp Eradication Operation July 19 At Devils Lake

Portland—The first step in the rehabilitation of Devils lake in Lincoln county will take place Thursday, July 19, when the lake will be chemically treated with rotenone, it was announced today by John Rayner, chief of the fishery division, Oregon Game commission.

Plans call for spreading 27,000 pounds of powdered rotenone throughout the lake and 550 gallons of liquid rotenone in the marshland areas and tributaries. Thirty game commission employees will carry out the treatment using two of the barge type spreaders, similar to those used in the Diamond lake treatment, and eight outboard motor boats.

Primary reason for the rotenone treatment is to remove the carp which have infested the lake, although all fish, including game fish, will be killed by the chemical. No other forms of aquatic life will suffer ill effects nor is the chemical harmful to humans.

The rotenone does not affect the edibility of the fish killed, and persons are invited to pick them up for use if they so desire. No attempt will be made to bar boats from the lake during the treatment operations.

Plans for the second phase of the rehabilitation—that of restocking the lake—have not been completed to date. The feasibility of restocking with salmonoids and warm-water species is under careful study by the commission.
