

Chicago Hosts Demo Convention More Often Than Any Other City

Chicago — (U.P.) — Democrats will be coming 'home' when they bring their national convention with its donkeys, cowbells and rousing floor fights to Chicago starting August 13.

Since Civil War days, this lusty giant on the shores of Lake Michigan has entertained the Democrats more often than any other city.

And the party of Thomas Jefferson has scored its greatest successes with presidential candidates chosen at this "lucky" site.

The party has held its presidential nominating convention here eight times—this year's will be the ninth—since it first came to Chicago in 1864 to nominate George B. McClellan to run unsuccessfully against Civil War President Abraham Lincoln.

Only Baltimore can boast as many Democratic conventions. It has had nine, seven of them before Chicago got started.

It was in Chicago that the party twice started Grover Cleveland on his road to the White House. And it was here that the Democrats came up with a four-time winner, Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Cleveland Again
After McClellan's unsuccessful try, the party did not return to Chicago — and didn't come up with a winner—until it ticketed Cleveland here in 1884.

Four years later the Democrats tried nominating Cleveland in St. Louis, and he lost to Republican Chester A. Arthur. In 1892 they came back to Chicago, nominated Cleveland and he won a second term (with Adlai E. Stevenson, grandfather of the present presidential hopeful, as vice president).

The charm didn't hold in 1896 when William Jennings Bryan, the orator from Nebraska, stam-

ped the party conclave here with his rousing "cross of gold" speech in favor of free coinage. Bryan won the nomination on the fifth ballot over Missouri's Richard P. Bland, but William McKinley rode into the White House on a Republican wave.

A long Democratic drought followed, broken only by Woodrow Wilson's success in 1912 and 1916, and the Democrats didn't return to their "lucky" city until depression-ridden 1932.

To the tune of "Happy Days Are Here Again," the 1932 convention nominated New York Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt on the fourth ballot after William Gibbs McAdoo threw California's 44 votes to FDR and announced that House Speaker John Nance Garner had released Texas' 46 votes to Roosevelt. Al Smith, who had rallied the opposition, went home broken-hearted and FDR dramatically fled to Chicago to declare war on the depression.

1952 Fight
The Democrats shifted to Philadelphia in 1936 to go through the role of renominating Mr. Roosevelt, but returned to Chicago Stadium in 1940 to name FDR by acclamation for an unprecedented third term. A party revolt raged for five hours before Harry Hopkins and other Roosevelt lieutenants succeeded in ramming through FDR's choice, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, as vice president.

Again in 1944, when the party went with FDR with only a token protest vote for Sen. Harry E. Byrd (Va.), the vice presidential contest provided the fireworks at the Chicago convention. That year it was Wallace supporters who staked a show-stopping demonstration in a floor battle to keep their hero on the

party ticket. But President Roosevelt had given Wallace the heavy-to with a "nice fellow" letter of reference, and tapped Sen. Harry S. Truman (Mo.) as his running mate. Truman finally emerged from a field of 16 other vice presidential hopefuls after an eight-hour dogfight.

The Democrats squared off in perhaps their stormiest convention fight four years ago in their first visit to Chicago's International Amphitheater, site of this year's meeting. A northern "Young Turk" group headed by Sen. Blair Moody of Michigan and Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. fought to oust 64 delegates from Louisiana, Virginia and South Carolina because they refused to sign a party "loyalty" pledge.

The southerners were seated after a wild and stormy 14-hour session that became entangled in a maze of parliamentary rulings, and the convention went on to "draft" Adlai Stevenson on the third ballot.

Cannery Workers Accept Contract

Portland — (U.P.) — An offer has been accepted by Cannery Workers local 809, Teamsters, from Hudson House Inc. and Gray & Co. at Forest Grove which will mean a two-year contract, pay increases and other benefits.

Union Secretary C. C. Evanson praised the co-operation of the companies in the negotiations. The offer came as the result of a 14-hour session with Federal Mediator Clyde Deal. In addition to the pay increases, the contract includes a health and welfare program, a pension plan, and upgrading of some jobs.

Yankton, S. D. — (U.P.) — George Burnell, Beresford, S. D., who never had piloted a plane before, took the controls of a light plane Tuesday when the pilot fell dead and landed safely at a Yankton airport.

The pilot, Harold Davidson, 47, Vermillion, was pronounced dead on arrival at a Yankton hospital.

Davidson and Burnell were patrolling power lines when Davidson slumped over the controls. Burnell, unable to feel any

pulse, took over and headed for the nearest airport. He brought the plane down at Yankton in what was described as a "smooth landing."

Pilots To Renew Plea For Air Safety Board

Washington — (U.P.) — The nation's commercial pilots plan to renew their demands that Congress strip the Civil Aeronautics Board of its authority to investigate air crashes.

A spokesman for the Airline Pilots Association told the United Press Tuesday his group will ask for rebirth of the old independent Air Safety Board that was abolished by President Roosevelt 16 years ago.

Grants Pass Selected By Spanish War Vets

Eugene — (U.P.) — Grants Pass has been selected by Oregon's Spanish War veterans as the city for their annual encampment next year.

The veterans are meeting this week at Eugene. Officers were nominated by the veterans and their auxiliary Tuesday.

Nearly 100 veterans and about 130 auxiliary delegates are registered at the convention. There are some 600 Spanish War veterans still living in Oregon.
