New York—(U.P.)—On this Friday the 13th, the 13th day of the steel strike, industrial stocks registered their 10th rise in 13 sessions and the market made up the 13 per cent decline from a six-day cumulative rise suffered Thursday.

Railroad shares improved and reached a new high since May 7. For industrials it was the best level touched since May 7 and for the market as a whole since May 11.

Ontario, Ore.—(U.P.)—A flash flood that swept rocks and uprooted trees onto Union Pacific tracks caused derailment of a freight train and held up east and west bound streamline passenger trains for six hours last night near Cobb, Ida., 11 miles west of Weiser.

No one was hurt in the mishap. The four diesel units of the freight train and 11 boxcars were derailed.
Fortunately, the derailment occurred near a passing track, and after the six-hour delay, the streamliners were able to proceed. Crews were reported working today to clear the main line.
