

Mel Parnell Hurls No-Hit Game; NY 'Balloons' Lead; Mantle Hits

Mel Parnell, a sore arm case since early 1954, Saturday pitched the first no-hitter by a Boston Red Sox pitcher in 33 years when he scored a classic 4-0 triumph over the Chicago White Sox.

A crowd of 14,542 at Boston's Fenway park saw the 34-year-old southpaw face only 28 batters in becoming the first Red Sox pitcher to gain no-hit immortality since Howard Ehmke in 1923. It was also the first no-hit effort in the American league since Bobo Holloman pitched one in his first major league start for the St. Louis Browns, May 6, 1953.

The Red Sox' all-time senior pitcher in point of service entered the game with a 2-2 mark and had won only seven games since early 1954 when he was placed on the disabled list because of a sore arm. He had lost eight straight games to the White Sox since he last beat them May 3, 1953.

Parnell walked only two batters and another White Sox batter reached base on Don Budin's third-inning error. He issued the second walk to Sam Esposito to open the ninth but two consecutive forceouts and Walt Dropo's easy tap to the mound ended the suspense.

The Red Sox backed Parnell with an eight-hit attack that handed Jim McDonald, just returned from Vancouver in the P.C.L., his first loss. They scored two runs in the fourth inning with Mickey Vernon singling one home and Ted Williams tallying the other during a double play. Single runs in the sixth and seventh innings added to Parnell's cushion.

Carl Erskine of the Brooklyn Dodgers pitched the only other no-hitter of the 1956 season against the New York Giants on May 12.

The New York Yankees, meanwhile, ballooned their A.L. lead to 9½ games over the White Sox and Cleveland when they defeated the Indians, 5-4, in 10 innings. Billy Martin singled off reliever Bob Feller with the bases filled in the 10th after a pinch-homer by Sam Mele tied the score for the Indians in the ninth. Mickey Mantle hit his 30th homer for the Yankees.

The Baltimore Orioles defeated the Kansas City Athletics, 1-0, and the Detroit Tigers won a battle of six homers in edging out the Washington Senators, 6-5, in the other American League games.

Mike Fornieles limited the Athletics to three hits, struck out seven and walked only one batter in winning his second game for Baltimore. He got the only run he needed in the first inning when Hoot Evers walked, stole second and scored on George Kell's wind-brown single.

Al Kaline, Bill Tuttle and Bob Kennedy homered for the Tigers while Jim Lemon, Eddie Yost and Whitey Herzog hit round-trippers for the Senators. Frank Lary won his seventh game for Detroit although he needed help from both Billy Hoelt and Walt Masterson in the ninth.

In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves made it four straight over the Dodgers, 3-2, and opened up a two-game first-place lead when Robin Roberts blanked the Cincinnati Redlegs, 2-0.

Hank Aaron singled home Johnny Logan from second base with the winning run after the Braves tied the score at 2-2 when Joe Adcock blasted a two-run homer in the seventh. The blow, off Sal Maglie, was Adcock's eighth of the year against the Dodgers and marked the fifth straight game in which he connected for the circuit. Ernie Johnson, who pitched the 10th inning, received credit for his second win of the series and third of the season.

Roberts limited the Redlegs to four hits in gaining his ninth victory and first shutout of the season. A walk, Stan Lopata's single, a forceout, an infield out and Willie Jones' single provided the Phillies with both their runs off Johnny Klippstein in the fourth inning. The loss was the Redlegs' third in a row since the all-star break.

Alvin Dark drove in three runs with three hits and sacrifice fly to pace the St. Louis Cardinals to a 5-2 triumph over the New York Giants. Dark, who had four-for-four Friday night, banged out nine hits in 11 tries as the Cardinals swept the three-game series. Vinegar Bend Mizell limited the Giants to five hits to score his ninth victory of the campaign.

Jim King homered in the first game and singled home the winning run in the 10th inning of

the nightcap as the Chicago Cubs beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2 and 6-5, in the other National League games. Bob Rush went the distance for his eighth win in the opener and relief pitcher Turk Lown won his third decision in the second game.

SO Junior Golf Mix Begins Here Monday

A field of more than 40 boys and girls, headed by Ron Weber, Prineville, state junior tourney runner-up, tees off starting at 8 a.m., Monday for the first 18 holes of the annual Southern Oregon Junior Golf championships at Rogue Valley Country club.

Second 18 in the 36-hole tournament will be played on Tuesday. Weber will compete against eight others for the junior boys' crown. His opposition includes such contenders as Joe Hallmark, Roseburg, and Gary Harrington and Tom Hamlin, Medford. Hamlin was the boys' division victor in 1955. Others in the junior boys group this time are Bill Aubrey, Corvallis; Jack Vollstedt, Portland; Jack Walker, Medford; 8-20—Phil Austin, Ashland; 9-10—Jimmy Yngst, Crescent City; 9-24—Sandy Rubenstein, Eugene; Bob Soran, Klamath Falls; Albert Hartwell, Ashland.

21 Boys In Group
The junior boys are those 16 and 17 years of age. Twenty-one of the entries are in the boys' group, 12 through 15. Tom Kabler, Roseburg, will be back to defend his pee wee title against seven opponents. Six girls had been registered by Saturday to compete in the junior girls' and girls' brackets.

Nine Oregon and three northern California communities are represented among the entries. Players are coming from Crescent City, Eugene and Redding, Calif. Oregon communities having entries are Portland, Corvallis, Ashland, Prineville, Roseburg, Klamath Falls, Eugene, Hood River and Medford.

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McMurtry Victor Over Ez Charles

Tacoma, Wash. — (U.P.) — "Irish" Pat McMurtry punched his way into the heavyweight picture here Friday night by a unanimous 10-round decision over former heavyweight champion Ezz Charles.

The 24-year-old former Marine staggered Charles in the fourth and nearly had him on the canvas in the ninth, but he couldn't put over the finisher. McMurtry picked up his 21st victory in 22 fights at 182½ pounds. Charles came into the ring at 197½.

Early Command
The Tacoma fighter took command early in the fight and kept Charles in trouble all the way with a sharp left jab. He opened up with solid right hand punching later in the fight and swarmed all over the former champ in the ninth.

Charles lost two rounds on low punching and in the seventh a two-minute intermission was called when Charles hurt McMurtry with a low blow.

The judges said it 99-89 and 99-90 for McMurtry, and referee Davey Ward had it 97-82. The United Press scored it 99-88 for McMurtry.

SW Oregon General Deer Season Tentatively Set For Sept. 29 to Oct. 21

The possible Rogue Valley special season Nov. 24 to Dec. 2 is for one deer of either sex for huntsmen with unused tags. Area involved is bounded on the east side by a line from Bybee bridge to Medford. The boundary westward follows highway 238 to the Applegate river at Applegate. It follows the Applegate to the Rogue river and the Rogue to Robertson bridge. North boundary parallels the river between Robertson and Bybee bridges and follows a line two miles north of the stream.

General deer season in other areas of the state is planned for Sept. 29 to Oct. 13 in the tentative regulations.

Dove and Pigeon hunting is slated Sept. 1 to 30, antelope season Sept. 1 to 5, archery deer and elk hunts generally Sept. 8 to 23. Season for pheasants will be Oct. 20 to Nov. 12.

Commissioners held a hearing in Portland Friday and in the tentative regulations followed closely staff recommendations. A second public hearing will be on July 27 in Portland. Final regulations will not be adopted until after that session and seasons as set up in the tentative rules could be changed.

The Sept. 29 to Oct. 12 buck season will be in Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry and Douglas counties and in a small part of Klamath county. In central Oregon from Oct. 17 to Oct. 21 and in eastern Oregon and western Oregon, outside of the southwest counties, from Oct. 13 to 21, hunter's choice hunting is planned.

In the general season, bag limit is one buck with forked horns. A limit of one deer with visible antlers is proposed for east of the Cascade summit.

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Braves in 1st Place Friday Thanks to Adcock's Hitting

Milwaukee shouldered its way back into first place in the National league Friday and the guy leading the way was big, jolting Joe Adcock, who bombarded the Dodgers hard.

Brooklyn pitchers aren't scheduled to face Adcock again for more than two weeks, but after the misery he caused them Friday night in helping the Braves sweep a two-night doubleheader, 8-6 and 6-5, they'd be much happier if they could avoid him the rest of the season.

Adcock blasted his 14th homer of the season with one on off Don Newcombe to cap a six-run rally in the first inning of the opener and then returned to

smash his 15th homer in the bases full off Carl Erskine in the sixth inning of the nightcap.

Something about Brooklyn's pitching seems to bring out the best in Adcock, who drove in five of Milwaukee's seven in the finale. He has hit seven homers in 13 games against the Dodgers this season, and the battered Brooks still remember how he hammered four homers and a double in one game against them on June 31, 1954.

The Yankees, threatening to make a runaway of the American league race, stretched their lead to 8½ games by routing the Indians, 10-0, for their seventh victory in a row.
