

Three People Hurt In Car Accidents

Three people were reported in "good" condition Saturday morning at Sacred Heart hospital, where they were taken by Medford Ambulance service after receiving injuries in accidents Friday.

Kenneth Larry Thompson, 5, of 1133 Spring st., received a broken left leg and head injuries at 2:35 p.m., when he was struck by a car on Spring st. near Wabash ave.

Hurt in Collision
Edward Wynkauf, 34, of 33 South Front st., received a fractured right arm, head lacerations and a possible spine injury at 10:12 p.m., when the car in which he was riding collided with another on Highway 99 in front of Kim's restaurant. Chester McDonough, 62, route 1, box 24, Jacksonville, received chest injuries in the same accident. McDonough's wife, Valerie, was released from the hospital following treatment for a cut left elbow.

State police said the Thompson boy was struck by a vehicle operated by Bennie Dale Kinney, 21, route 3, box 69, Medford. According to the report, Thompson told officers he was traveling west on Spring st. at about 35 miles per hour, when the child apparently ran into the street and hit the side of his car. He said he applied the brakes and the car skidded sideways, hit a bank and overturned.

Didn't See Boy
The boy was knocked to the side of the road. Officers said Kinney claimed he did not see the boy, who was on the other side of a string of eastbound cars. Kinney was not injured and no citation was issued.

The car in which Wynkauf was injured, operated by Robert Welling Rock, 25, of 941 South Holly st., was reportedly traveling north on the inside lane of Highway 99, when the vehicle operated by McDonough entered the highway from the driveway at Kim's restaurant. Officers said Rock saw the other car, applied the brakes and his car skidded 70 feet before turning sideways and colliding with McDonough's vehicle in the center of the highway.

Pinned Under Car
The impact apparently knocked Rock's car 37 feet and McDonough's car 40 feet. Rock's vehicle came to rest on its side on the south side of the highway and McDonough's car was facing east with the rear wheels on the highway edge. Wynkauf was partially pinned under Rock's car. No citations were issued.

No injuries were reported and no citations were issued after two trucks collided at 8:52 p.m. Friday on North Pacific hwy., in front of the Red Streak cafe.

Savings Bond Sales Shows Increase Here

Sale of United States series E and H savings bonds for June in Jackson county were \$118,356, compared to \$85,165 in 1955, according to Morris Leonard, chairman of the county savings bonds committee.

Sale of bonds through June 30, were \$640,169, compared to \$603,469 through June 30, 1955, Leonard said.

Leonard added that total sales of E and H bonds in Oregon in June of this year totaled \$3,316,693, an increase of 7.4 per cent more than June, 1955.
