The Medical Roundup

Gadgets To Help The Handicapped

Recently I spent days walking miles through the many exhibits presented at the last meeting of the American Medical Association. These covered large spaces on the Navy Piers in Chicago. Many of these exhibits were prepared by commercial firms which showed products of interest to physicians, while many were prepared by physicians and scientific groups to teach and to show the results of research work that has been done.

Two of the most interesting exhibits I saw were concerned with the helping of the handicapped. In one there were a number of men who were doing carpentry with an artificial hand or arm or leg. Interesting was a boy of six, who had been born without part of an arm. He had an artificial arm which enabled him to do a number of things. He showed me how, with a double hook apparatus, he could pick up things and move them about almost as well as if he had a thumb and finger.

One of the men with his forearm gone demonstrated an interesting arrangement. A surgeon had made for him a sort of tunnel through the tendon at the lower end of the strong muscle on the front of the upper arm. He had made a hole and lined it with skin. Through the hole now goes a wire that works an artificial hand. By contracting the muscle, the man can close the hand so as to grasp things.

Other artificial hands are worked from the shoulders with the help of a sort of harness. The modern artificial hand, made of flesh-tinted rubber or some plastic, looks so natural that many a person will fail to note that the person sitting opposite him hasn't his own original hand.

Complete official returns showed that Prado received 568,443 votes to 457,977 for Fernando Belaunde Terry and 222,595 for Hernando de LaValle, who was backed by the eight-year-old administration of outgoing President Manuel Odría.
