Coast elk season has been tentatively set for Oct. 27 to Nov. 12 and a season from Oct. 27 to Nov. 27 in the Cascades and the bull and cow territories of Eastern Oregon.

Controlled elk hunts will be held in Tillamook, Clatsop, Birch Creek, Milton and Promise areas as last season with the additions of Shaw mountain area of Union county this year. Quail season was tentatively set to run concurrently with the pheasant season Oct. 20 to Nov. 21. Valley quail and bobwhite

Girl Seeks Strait Conquest

Victoria, B.C. — (UP) — Marilyn Bell prepared today to start training tomorrow for her assault on the Strait of Juan de Fuca in August.

She revealed that an attempt on the dangerous strait may be her last swim effort—she will decide after the swim, which she describes as her "biggest yet." She explained that she will be entering McGill University in September to train as a physiotherapist and might not

have the time for long-distance swim training.

Marilyn will get \$20,000 for trying to be the second person across the strait and another \$10,000 if she makes it. Training will start tomorrow with a one-hour swim in the strait off Oak Bay. She will work up to about six hours a day and make the attempt late in August.

She was confident she would be successful and Coach Gus Ryder agreed.

"She is in better condition than ever before," he said, "she will make it okay."

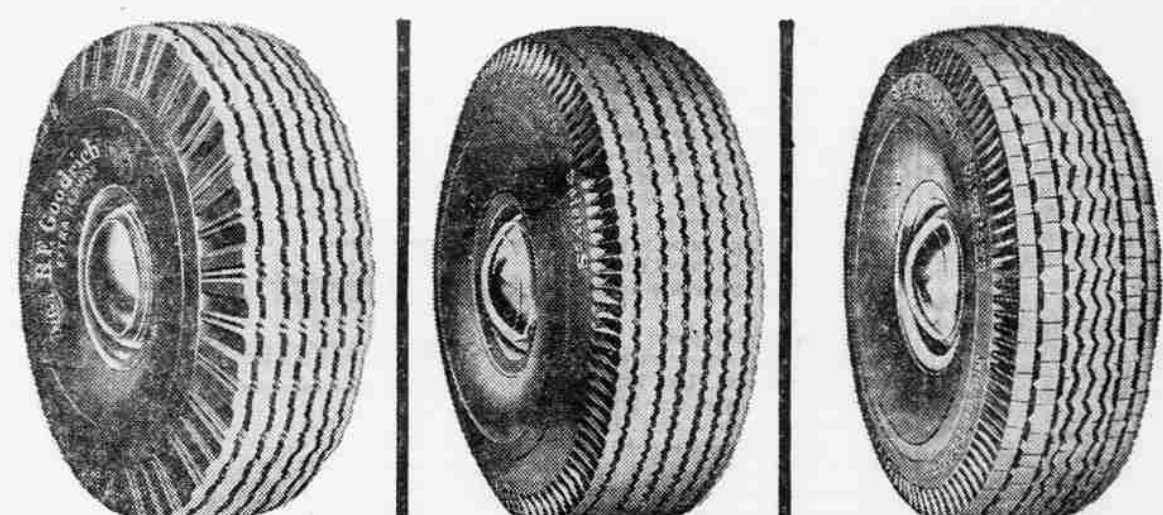
Marilyn said the cold water,
