Thornton Rules on Revenue Distribution

Salem — (UP) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton has ruled that a 1955 statute providing for filing of annual census estimates by the State Census board does not change distribution of state-shared highway revenues to cities over 100,000.

Funds for such cities are distributed on the basis of two-thirds of the actual population. Thornton said the purpose of the 1955 law was to create a board which would make an annual estimate of city population and reduce the number of special censuses.

This annual census would insure a more equitable distribution of state-shared revenues in accordance with the prevailing growth of cities, Thornton said. He added that the legislature did not intend to change the existing population basis for apportionment.
