

Haney Concentrates Braves' Power on Vengeance Against Old Bosses from Pa.

Fred Haney's "7-11" winning streak as the new manager of the Milwaukee Braves were making them a hot pennant bet today and giving him revenge against the Pittsburgh Pirates, who fired him.

Haney quickly ran up a seven-game winning streak when his Braves came home to Milwaukee for a long stand against the eastern teams, knocking off the Dodgers four in a row and the Pirates three straight, including Monday's 2-1 triumph. That kept them two full games ahead of second place Cincinnati.

And when Haney inherited the job as Milwaukee manager, succeeding not so jolly Cholly Grimm, the Braves whizzed to a spectacular 11-game streak. In that one, the first two triumphs were over the Dodgers and the next three against Pittsburgh.

To most men, getting fired as manager of the Pirates would be like a parole from a prison sentence, but right now Haney seems to be making practically a federal case of his revenge.

Buhl Winning Hurler
Monday, Haney's zanies gained another fine pitching job from Bob Buhl, who walked nobody, struck out four and scattered

seven hits for his 11th victory. Hank Aaron lined a center field homer for the victory margin against loser Ronnie Kline. Earlier, Frank Thomas homered to spoil Buhl's shutout.

The Phillies, capitalizing on a western tour, won their sixth game in the last seven at St. Louis, defeating the Cardinals 2-0 on the seven-hit pitching of lefty Harvey Haddix. It was the third time Haddix had beaten the Cardinals since General Manager Frank Lane traded him away to Philadelphia. Haddix now has a 7-3 mark with the Phils and is 8-3 for the season. He struck out eight Cards and walked but one. Doubles by Richie Ashburn and Marv Blaylock drove in the two lone runs.

At Cincinnati, Gus Bell, Ed Bailey and Frank Robinson hit homers to give the Redlegs an easy 10-4 decision over the Giants, who lost their seventh

game in a row. Cincy now has 121 homers for 81 games and has exactly 100 to go before equalling the all-time major league record of 221 set by the 1947 Giants. Art Fowler went all the way for his sixth victory. Loser Johnny Antonelli was tagged with his eighth defeat.

Dodgers Beat Cubs
The Dodgers gained an abbreviated 4-1 decision over the Cubs at Chicago in a six-inning game called because of rain. Gil Hodges hit a three-run homer in the first inning to set up a Craig, who came up to Brooklyn as a raw rookie just a year ago Monday. Craig, in his anniversary showing as a tested veteran, yielded only two hits.

Cleveland topped Boston, 7-3 in the only American League contest. The Indians made 17 hits, every starter getting at least one and Hal Naragon and Jim Busby getting three each. Busby and Jack Jensen of the lesser hit homers.

The Chicago at New York American League game was rained out and the other teams were not scheduled.

Dallas, Tex. —U.P.— Boston Red Sox owner Tom Yawkey has spent millions for baseball talent, but one of the classiest looking Sox farm hands in these parts is a pint-sized outfielder who cost millionaire Yawkey two pairs of baseball shoes.

He is Albie Pearson, who looks more like the batboy of the Oklahoma City Indians than he does the Texas League's third leading hitter and one of its top defensive flychasers.

Pearson is a product of El Monte High in Alhambra, Calif., the same school which spawned the Yankees' Tom Morgan, and like Morgan—he was a star pitcher in his schoolboy days.

But, the wiry little southpaw never did get a chance to pitch when he broke into organized baseball under Red Marion at San Jose after being signed by Red Sox Scout Tom Downey.

The club was shy an outfielder and the five foot, six inch Pearson persuaded Marion he could play the outfield, too. So into the lineup he went, getting four hits each of the first two nights. He's been an outfielder ever since.

Broadcasters Top Bidders For Tigers

Detroit —U.P.— The 11-man group headed by broadcasters Fred Knorr and John Fetter today was hailed as the winning bidder for the Detroit Tigers, but the real winner may have been "Spike" Briggs.

After Walter O. "Spike" Briggs Jr. announced the Tiger board of directors had accepted the Knorr-Fetter proposal of a record \$5,500,000, Knorr announced Briggs would be the executive vice president of the club.

This was a triumph for the son of the late Tiger owner Walter O. Briggs Sr. and Spike, who has been determined to stay with the club and continue his father's policies, admitted it.

Asked if he thought the Briggs' estate trustees would uphold the selection of the Knorr-Fetter group's bid, Briggs said, "I won this one, let's wait and see."

The Knorr-Fetter winning bid calls for payment of \$4,600,000 cash, \$1,000,000 of this to be paid by Aug. 1, and the remaining \$900,000 to be paid off in at least five years at four per cent interest.

Knorr had also made a bid of \$5,000,000 cash for the club, but this was topped by three other cash bids. Groups which offered more immediate cash were headed by Bill Vecek, \$5,250,000; Jack Kent Cooke, Toronto, \$5,180,000; and Hollywood producer Robert Goldstein, \$5,050,000.

None of the other three groups had plans for putting Spike Briggs in a top, policy making position. Knorr, an old friend of Briggs, said Spike would be in such a position if he was the winning bidder.
