A New Drug Better Than Morphine

I was just reading the report of a new pain-relieving drug that has been synthesized by Drs. John Weillard, Peter D. Orlovsky, Alan P. Sullivan and George Frederick Purdue, Frederick K. Heath and Karl Pfister, III. The drug is said to be much better than morphine in that it has few of the disturbing effects that morphine has on the body. Unfortunately, it can produce habituation, and hence it will have to be used with care, and only for short periods of time when a pain is severe. I mention this new drug because I wish to keep reminding you good readers that research work of this type is going on all the time in the many great research laboratories of the world. Every week new drugs of great usefulness are found. The big drug houses now plough back millions of dollars into their research in order to find new drugs and vaccines for us. Years ago there was almost no research of this type. Then half a century ago men like Dr. Abel, of Johns Hopkins University, founded departments of pharmacology, in which new drugs were searched for and synthesized. Now, much of this work has been taken over by the drug houses which can spend enormous sums and can attract excellent chemists to their well-equipped laboratories.

L.R.T.—He must marry our daughter.

Madge—I don't want to be forced on him.

Mrs. L.R.T.—Our daughter, Madge, 18, is about to have a baby, although unmarried. The man in the situation is more than 10 years her senior, and is the black sheep of his family, who are very respected people in our own circle.

We believe our daughter implicitly. She says they had a secret engagement, but the young man not only denies this, but also denies having been intimate with her. Nevertheless, because of pressure from his parents, he is willing to marry her.

My husband feels strongly that I should be married at once, but I think it would be a terrible crime to tie our little girl to this scoundrel for life. He could not make either a decent father or a good husband. I would much rather let our daughter remain unmarried and assume the burden of caring for the baby than have this awful wretch for a son-in-law.

Madge—I think if my parents had not interfered and frightened Bob, he would not take this attitude. I love him and I believe he loves me. What happened was as much my fault as his, but he had to be on the defensive because he knew all the blame would be heaped on him.

I want to marry him, but I do not want him forced to marry me. I think if both sets of parents were to let him be, he would soon enough come around and marry me for my own sake and for the sake of our child.

L.R.T.—Bob is a moral weakling and our daughter is too young to know what is best. When they were allowed to do as they pleased, they got into tragic trouble.
