The pretty brunette, now 17, recently returned from a vacation trip to Honolulu with her family, headed by band leader Bob Crosby.

Cathy brought back the usual sunburn and bright sports shirts—but also a new light in her eyes for a good-looking former college football star, Ray Westphal.

"He got an engagement or something like that," insisted the post-blonde. "After all, I'm only 17 and he has to go into the Marine Corps."

"But I do like him. I don't want to say much about it for fear of spoiling something. I'll just wait and see what happens."

Cathy was distressed and embarrassed when her friends let her know the secret of her romance. Unfortunately, such is the price of fame.

Ray's name met Westphal at a party given for her shortly before the Crosby left Honolulu.

"There were about 100 guests and several persons my age had been invited," she said. "Ray was there. I saw him every day after that and since I've come back we've been writing each other. I do hope to see him again when he comes here."

Westphal lives in Honolulu now but he formerly attended Oregon State College where he was a gridiron hero.

Youngful Marriage Doubtful. Cathy's friends doubt that she'll follow other young actresses such as Elizabeth Taylor and Shirley Temple into a youthful marriage. Cathy is only beginning a promising career on television. She sings three days a week on father Bob's daytime TV show on CBS and next fall she'll appear once a week.

Improvements Due Contaminated River. New Ark, N.J.—A \$9,100,000 improvement program is expected to bring back swimming and boating regattas to the Passaic river, once considered one of the most contaminated in the nation.

The return of recreation to the river, however, will be only a pleasant by-product of the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission program. Main aim, according to chairman Herman Blank, is to save taxpayers of the 28 municipalities served by the system a capital outlay of from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 and doubled operating costs.

Ordinance Vetoes Dog's Life for Dog

Philadelphia — U.P.—A new breed of dog — non-barking, non-biting and a respecter of persons and property — is being legislated into existence in near-by Havertford Township.

Township Ordinance No. 980 prohibits a dog from leading a dog's life. Havertford dogs are forbidden to bark, howl, yelp or make "unseemingly noises." Any that step out of line make their owners liable to a fine ranging from \$5 to \$100. They must not damage property, including shrubs, flowers and hedges.

Patrick Henry's Speech To Be Sold for Benefit. Richmond, Va. — U.P.—Patrick Henry's famous "Liberty or Death" speech, made 181 years ago, will soon be put on the record. Henry delivered the address in St. John's Church here in 1775. Trustees of the church have voted to have the speech recorded and sold for the church's benefit.

Portland — U.P.—Completion of the sale of M & M Wood Working company to the Simpson Timber company appeared near at hand today.

Spokesmen said about 94 per cent of M & M's outstanding shares have been deposited with the banking concern handling the transaction, well above the 80 per cent that Simpson had required for purchase of the shares in advance of the liquidation of the Portland corporation.

No closing date on the near \$47,000,000 deal has been announced. Under procedures outlined to stockholders when they voted to liquidate the corporation, the buyer is to notify the bank 15 days before the closing date.
