

ADCOCK RAPS 2 HOMERS AS BRAVES ROUT GIANTS

Some baseball "experts" mock big Joe Adcock as a "guess hitter," but he's guessing so well these days that he ought to be on one of those television quiz shows.

The six-foot, four-inch Milwaukee slugger put on another of his home run sprees Thursday with a grand slam homer, a three-run homer, and two more hits for a total of eight runs batted in in a 13-3 rout of the New York Giants.

The victory enabled the Braves to retain their two-game National League lead over the Cincinnati Redlegs, who drubbed Brooklyn at night, 7-2.

Whether or not Adcock really guesses what each pitch will be, there's no denying he's the hottest slugger in the majors. His total of 19 home runs includes 10 in the last 13 games, a period in which he drove in a total of 23 runs. And the Braves won 11 of those 13 games to take over the league lead.

Adcock, who literally chased Giant pitcher Ruben Gomez out of the park Tuesday after being hit by a pitch, chased Giant starter Jim Hearn in the first inning with his 400-foot grand slam homer. He added his three-run homer in the sixth off Dick Littlefield. He doubled in the third and singled home a run in the fourth. His eight RBIs were a single-game high in the National League this year.

Ed Mathews drove in three of the Braves' other runs and Warren Spahn breezed to his ninth win for the league leaders with an eight-hitter.

Jeffcoat Beats Maglie
The Redlegs, trailing 2-1 after Gil Hodges hit his 20th homer in the sixth, went ahead in the same frame on Gus Bell's 18th circuit blow with one on and wrapped it up with four in the seventh. Hal Jeffcoat won over Sal Maglie in a pitching duel.

In the only other NL game, Dee Fondy's homer with two out in the 10th inning gave Chicago a 4-3 win over the Philadelphia Phillies. Jim King and Walt Morin also homered for the Cubs and Granddammer for the Phils. Turk Lown won in relief, his second win in three days.

In the American League, the New York Yankees stretched their runaway league lead to 10½ games with a 7-3 victory over Detroit when second-place Cleveland lost to Washington, 5-4, on Eddie Yost's second homer of the game with two out in the ninth inning.

Byrne Wins Fifth
The Yankees, tied, 3-3, erupted for four runs in the sixth to win as Hank Bauer's bases-loaded double highlighted the rally. Tommy Byrne gained his fifth win with relief help from Tom Morgan.

Cleveland blew a 4-0 lead in losing to Washington as Bunky Stewart stopped them with two-hit pitching in 7 1/3 relief innings.

The Chicago White Sox at last ended their 11-game losing streak as southpaw Billy Pierce scattered six hits and fanned nine to nip Baltimore, 3-2. It was Pierce's 14th victory, tying him with Johnny Kucks of the Yankees.
