

Increased Revenue Predicted for BLM in New Fiscal Year

The bureau of land management expects to earn \$236 million during fiscal year 1956-57, an all-time high, according to Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton.

Seaton made the prediction this week. Congress has authorized a record \$18,369,300 appropriation for the bureau, the biggest in BLM history, and \$3.6 million over last year's appropriation.

An additional \$4.5 million has been authorized by Congress for BLM construction. Most of the money will go into construction of access roads for an enlarged timber program in western Oregon.

Lands, Minerals
Lands and minerals received the largest portion of increased appropriation, \$1.9 million. This is designated to implement legislation to correct abuses of mineral laws through multiple use of surface resources.

The total lands and minerals appropriation is \$5.3 million which will permit employment of additional field commissioners to conduct hearings under public laws 167 and 359 and allow additions to the field examinations and land office staffs.

The 163 million acres of O&C timberlands in western Oregon will be involved in an expanded forest management program to cost \$3,981,000, made possible by a \$614,000 portion of the increase. Public domain forest lands outside national forest boundaries in the United States and Alaska will be affected also.

Conservation Work
A \$550,000 increase makes \$3,301,400 available to the bureau for soil and moisture conservation work. It is now working with four other land agencies and the geological survey on a 20-year interior department program for revitalization of public and Indian lands totaling approximately 270 acres.

Apart from the Oregon access roads, \$40,000 of the \$4.5 million construction funds will be used for buildings in McGrath and Central Alaskan towns.

Five Oregon Projects On Reclamation List

Denver—U.S.—The \$173,000,000 construction program announced by Reclamation Commissioner W. A. Desheimer includes five Oregon projects.

They are: Klamath project, \$57,500, to complete pumping installations, continue low-cost lining studies and complete flood and economic studies.

Grants Pass project, \$168,000 to start installation of fish protection facilities at Savage Rapids dam.

Crescent Lake Dam, \$11,000 for minor completion work.

Deschutes project, North Unit, \$1,034,768 to continue work on Haystack dam and equalizing reservoir.

Rogue River Basin Project, Talent Division, \$2,400,000 to start work in the summer of 1957 on Howard Prairie dam and reservoir, for work on Keene Creek dam and reservoir, and to start construction on canals, delivery canals and laterals and the Green Springs power plant.

Nasser-Nehru-Tito Conference Ended

Briuni, Yugoslavia—U.S.—Leaders of Yugoslavia, India and Egypt wound up their neutralist conference yesterday with a review of Yugoslavia's impressive naval forces.

Egyptian Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru were scheduled to leave together for Cairo after the parade of the Yugoslav Navy off the coast of Marshal Tito's summer headquarters on this tiny island in the Adriatic.

Whether Tito, Nasser and Nehru reached any profound conclusions in their 24-hour conference on world problems remained a well-kept secret.

Change in Hungary Policy Doubtful

Vienna—U.S.—Iron Curtain experts expressed doubt today that the downfall of Hungary's "Little Stalin," Matyas Rakosi, would improve the lot of the common man in the Soviet satellite despite promises of a "new look" policy by his successor.

Rakosi's resignation as first secretary of the Hungarian Communist party and from the all-powerful Politburo was announced Wednesday. He was replaced by Moscow-trained Erno Gero, first deputy premier and the country's economic czar.

Nebraska Cattlemen Plan Own 'Get Well' Program

Omaha, Neb.—U.S.—Nebraska cattlemen, long regarded as an extremely independent breed, have voted to launch their own 'get well' program independent of the federal government.

Some 840 cattlemen are on record in favor of a program which would cost a cattle raiser 10 cents for each head of cattle he markets. The program would

finance a producer-controlled promotion and advertising program.

The cattle industry, hurt through falling prices in recent years, can recover through a vigorous sales campaign, many leading cattlemen feel.

One of the leaders in the drive to establish a 10-cent mandatory "check-off" on cattle is Bern R. Coulter, former president of the Nebraska Stock Growers Assn. Coulter, a Bridgeport, Neb., rancher, feels that anyone who can't afford a dime a head should get out of the business.

Other leaders including Harry B. Coffey, president of the Omaha Union Stock Yards Co., feel a mandatory check-off might be impractical because it could cause ill will on the part of some producers.

In order to establish the mandatory check-off in Nebraska, the state will have to pass enabling legislation. But that's as far as any government will be involved in the program.

Coulter, at a recent stock growing convention in North Platte, said that beef is the outstanding buy in meats. He is backed solidly by a militant group of ranch wives known as the Nebraska Cow-Belles, who have begun their own beef promotion campaign.

Days of "penny ante" promotion are over.

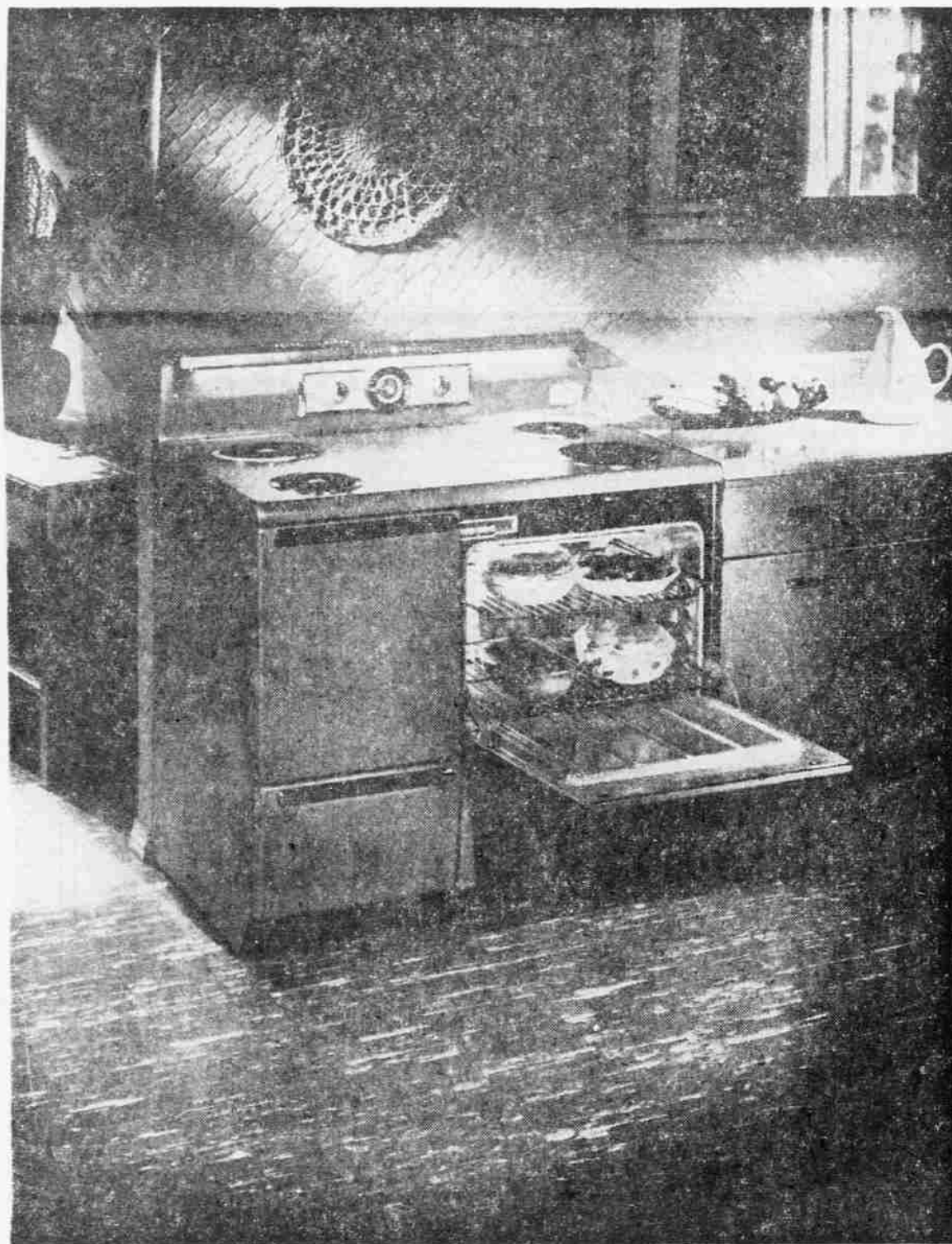
