Wreckage of Plane Found; Four Dead

Ellensburg — UP — Wreckage of a private plane missing since Saturday with its four occupants was found near here Wednesday. There were no survivors.

The wrecked single-engine Piper Tri-Pacer was found in Nannum Canyon about 15 miles northwest of Ellensburg by a ground party. The wreckage was sighted earlier in the day by a search plane.

Dead in the wreckage were

Max Wall, 39, Yakima; Lindsay Peehl, 25, Yakima; James Noblitt, 27, Seattle; and Jesse Noblitt, 47, Hayward, Calif.

A ground party was sent to the scene and carried the bodies to Ellensburg.

The plane, piloted by Wall, left Ellensburg Saturday afternoon for a flight over Grand Coulee dam. When it failed to land at Yakima, its final destination, a search was started.

Distribution of Liquor Tax Monies Announced

Salem — UP — Distribution of liquor tax monies totaling \$240,000 for the quarter ended June 30 has been announced by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry.

Newbry said the funds are distributed 75 per cent to the counties and 25 per cent to the state general fund. Counties expend the money for old age pensions, mother's aid and direct relief of the indigent.

Is That So?

How much do you know about women? How much about men? Judging from all the mistaken beliefs, isn't it time we're making a realistic evaluation? So here's another Fact vs. Fallacy — but before I start ducking



breakfasts, let me say that we are talking in terms of averages, and there are always, thank heaven, notable exceptions.

Fallacy: Men's bodies are more perfectly and more efficiently constructed than women's.

Fact: In muscular development the male body is superior—and that only after the male has passed adolescence. During birth, males come into the world with many more malformations and organic weaknesses. Also, during their lifetimes they are more likely to get out of killer and chemically they don't function as efficiently.

Fallacy: Women are more given to be hysterical than men.

Fact: A study made during the bombing of London in World War II does not bear this out. There it was found that more cases of hysteria occurred among the male civilians and the recovery of men under treatment was less rapid than among women.

Fallacy: Men can stand heat and cold or severe exposure much better than women can.

Fact: Women's bodies are better insulated with fat layers and they also function more efficiently in chemical action.

Fallacy: American fashion models tend to have typical American women figures.

Fact: Don't you believe it. Most professional models are tall and slender while a recent government survey shows that the average American woman is somewhat short and slightly wide in heels she stands 5 feet 4 against the average model's 5 feet 8; weighs 133 pounds against the models 112, and her waist is 29 inches against the model's 24.

Fallacy: Men and women stop growing when they are 21.

Fact: Both men and women may grow even after the age of 25, attaining their maximum height at 35 or 40. After that, they shrink about a quarter of an inch for every ten years due in part to the drying up of the cartilages in joints and spinal columns.

Fallacy: Women age more rapidly than men.

Fact: Under normal conditions, a man's body goes down-

hill more rapidly than a woman's. So, biologically speaking, he is older than a woman at the same age. He is less resistant to most diseases and with other hazards his remaining life span is shorter than a woman's.

Fallacy: Men and women have the same intelligence.

Fact: In some things women test higher—say in language, rote memory, and social and aesthetic tests. Men, on the contrary, test higher in mechanical, arithmetical and abstract reasoning problems. Because of these basic differences it is impossible to compare them in equal terms.

Fallacy: When faced with menacing problems or great suffering, women are more likely to commit suicide than men.

Fact: Sorry, men. The male suicide rate is four times higher—in older age, almost eight times higher. Probably this is because men take their failures more seriously or because illness hits them harder.

Fallacy: Men are generally superior to women in manual dexterity.

Fact: Where fine motions are involved, women are usually found superior. The difference goes back to early childhood: girls are able to button their clothes, turn doorknobs, wash the back of their necks, and tie their shoelaces before boys can.
