

# Burkemo Ousts Defending Champ Ford; Sarazen Surprise Winner in PGA

Canton, Mass. — U.P. — Revenge-minded Walter Burkemo, who had seen a pal knocked out on a technically Saturday morning by Doug Ford, squared accounts in the third round of the PGA Golf Championship today when he routed the defending champion, 5 and 3.

Grim-faced and protesting as Ford demanded a forfeit hole against Mike Deitz of Lake Orion, Mich., in the Saturday opening round—a match which Ford finally won on the fifth extra hole—Burkemo got even on his home Detroit district as he soundly walloped Ford in the afternoon.

It carried the deadly little match player, 1953 winner and three-time finalist, into the round of 16 along with such stars as Sam Snead, Jackie Burke, Ed Furgol, Fred Hawkins, Ted Krohl and ancient Gene Sarazen.

But it was a sad Saturday in the Blue Hills for a horde of the "name" stars who had teed off in the rain with their hopes high.

Along with Ford, those sent to the sidelines included such stars as Jimmy Demaret, Chick Harbert, Joe Kirkwood, Ellisworth Furgol and Al Besant in the morning's second round, and in the afternoon 18 such as Fred Haas, Skee Bazel, Jerry Barber, Art Wall, Shelley Mayfield and little Bob Toski.

Ford won his morning match by protesting a hole in which Deitz had called to spectators and asked how close Ford's approach shot was to the green. Ford claimed "outside assistance" and was upheld by the referee, making him all even at 18 holes instead of two down.

Burkemo growled about the decision—and then proceeded to take matters into his own hand on the course. He was out in 34, two under par, against Ford's 35, for a one-up lead, at nine holes and then won four straight holes on the back nine with two pars and two birdies to close it out against the hapless defending champion. That put Burkemo, four under par for 16 holes, into the round of 16 against Bill Johnston of Provo, Utah, who beat Tony Fortino of Glen Falls, N.Y., 4 and 3, by shooting even par.

Snead was one over par as he scored a 4 and 3 win over Toski, and moved into the fourth round against the veteran Sarazen, who won this for the third and his last time "way back in

1933. The 34-year-old Sarazen beat Mike Krak, the PGA driving champion from Steubenville, 3 and 2.

Jackie Burke, the Masters champion, had a close call as he bested Haas on the second extra hole by spanking his approach five feet from the pin for a winning birdie.

Hawkins had to go 19 holes to beat Art Wall of Pocomo Manor, Pa., after they were all square with 72.

Furgol, the 1954 U. S. Open king, squeezed past Barber, 2 and 1, by being two under par and now faces Bob Kay of West Hartford, Conn., who beat Mike Fetsch of Malabar, N.Y., 1 up with a 74 against a 76.

Worsham was two under par as he knocked off Mayfield, 5 and 4, while Krohl blasted Mike

Rooney of Wrightsville, Pa., 1 and 2, by playing par golf.

Jim Turnesa, the 1952 champion, best Jack Fleck, one up, with a 69 to a 79, to gain the round of 16 against Krohl. And in the Saturday eighth extra hole and final match, Henry Ransom of Chicago moved in against Worsham with a 23-hole, 1 up, triumph over former Masters champion Claude Harmon of Mamaroneck, N.Y.

Veteran Sarazen, not really anticipating going all the way, moved into the third round after picking up on two holes after the front nine. But coming back he had a two under par 33 to square the match and won on the first extra hole from Dick Lundahl of Pasadena, Calif.

### Studs Trip Drain; Clubs Tussle Today

Medford Cheney Studs, playing sharp, errorless ball, got a five-run jump on naps of two and three and snuffed off a ninth inning challenge at the fairgrounds here yesterday afternoon to whip the Drain Black Sox 5 to 2 in the opener of a three game week end Southern Oregon league baseball series.

It was the second decision over the Sox for the Studs this season and also the second in the history of rivalry between the two clubs.

Pitcher Derald Wooton, backed by the fire defensive support, hurled six-hit shutout ball

Jerry Bettendorf smashed the ball to Stratton at third base. The infielder, trying to hot box Maddox on a fielder's option, overthrew second. Maddox raced all the way home and on the throw-in Bettendorf went to second base. Lost in Sun.

Then came the break. Bill Martell hit a high fly to center field. Outfielder Ted Wilson lost the ball in the sun and it dropped in for a two-baser with Bettendorf scoring. Martell got to third base on a passed ball but Twink Pederson fanned to end the inning.

In the sixth inning Bettendorf and Pederson drew bases on balls and Wooton slammed

When Dougherty upheld Ford, Deitz announced that he was playing the match under protest. After Deitz holed out a two foot putt to birdie the 18th and win the hole, PGA officials met and after a 15-minute conference upheld the referee's ruling.

Ford won out on the fifth extra hole when he chipped into the cup from 30 feet off the green for a birdie three on the par four 427-yard hole.

They had halved the first four extra holes in even pars.

Among the second round casualties were Chick Harbert, a former PGA champion; the veteran Jimmy Demaret; Dick Mayer, Joe Kirkwood and Charles Prentice, who Friday had eliminated Tommy Bolt.

Masters champion Jackie Burke led the way into the third round with a 5 and 3 victory over Bill Collins of Grossinger, N.Y.

### Design Contest For Duck Stamp Opens Aug. 1

Washington, D.C.—The eighth Federal "duck stamp" contest to select a design for the 1957-58 issue of these stamps, which all duck hunters must purchase, will open this year on Aug. 1 and close on Nov. 1. John L. Farley, director of the fish and wildlife service, announced today.

Wildlife artists who reside to enter their drawings in the contest should submit them on or before the deadline date to the headquarters of the fish and wildlife service, Washington 25, D. C. Judging of the designs will take place early in November.

All interested artists are eligible to enter the contest and may submit as many designs as they wish. Entries must comply with contest rules. Upon request to the fish and wildlife service, prospective contestants will be sent a leaflet containing contest rules and suggestions, along with a copy of the agreement covering reproduction rights. This agreement is to be signed and returned to the service prior to the contest judging. If an artist submits more than one design, he is required to sign a separate agreement for each one.

### Ford Wins on Technicality; Burke Third Round Winner

Canton, Mass. — U.P. — Defending champion Doug Ford was saved from elimination in the second round of the PGA golf tournament Saturday when he was awarded a hole he lost because his opponent, Mike Deitz of Lake Orion, Mich., asked for outside aid.

Had it not been for that, Ford would have lost 2 down in 18 holes. But awarding him the 15th hole made the match even and he won out 1 up in 23 holes.

The rhubarb developed after Ford hit his second shot on the par four 338-yard 15th. As Deitz was preparing to hit his second, he asked some spectators how close Ford's shot was to the green. Sam Snead, co-favored with Ford for the title, defeated John C'Donnell of Baltimore, Md., 1 up 20 holes.

Ford immediately asked referee Ernie Dougherty, a former New England amateur champion, to award him the hole because
