

Seventh Annual Heyday Today in Ashland—5 p.m.

Ashland—All is in readiness for the first "big" event of the Oregon Shakespearean festival season. This evening at 5 the theatre gates will open to a scene of the Tudor Fair, the seventh annual Bard's Hey Day.

The largest attendance in the history of the event is expected, according to the Tudor guild, sponsors for the affair.

Elizabethan games, entertainment, music and contests will be Heyday features, with the primary attraction being the traditional pentathlon contest, in which members of the festival

company compete for cash prizes.

Entertainment will include tumblers, morris dancers (not to be confused with the dancing bear, who will also appear), a fortune teller, and a Punch and Judy show.

Visitors to the event will also get into the act, competing for prizes in a variety of games and contests. A family affair, Heyday has contests for the youngsters and family games such as skittles, darts, "horse racing" and a fish pond.

Also, the Tudor guild gift shoppes will be open. Dr. Bailey will offer the "Ashland Broad-sheets," and Beta Sigma Phi will sell coffee and soft drinks.

Tickets will be available at the theatre box office this evening. Admission to the fair is 50 cents for adults, with children under 10 admitted free when accompanied by their parents.

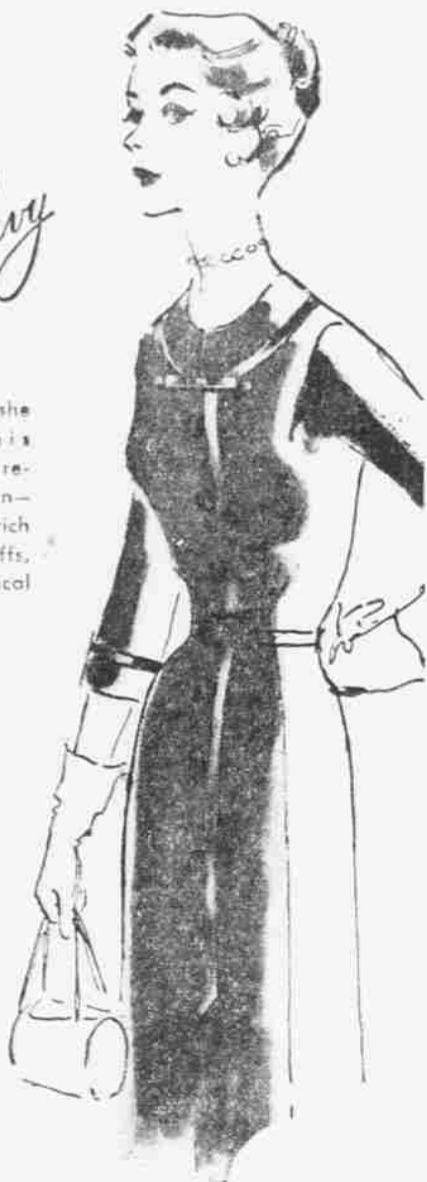
