### Festival Dress Rehearsals Opening in Ashland Tonight

Ashland — This week is the final "big push" at the Oregon Shakespeare festival. Dress rehearsals start tonight and will continue through two rotations of the plays.

William Patton, festival general manager, states that the first round of the dress rehearsals is closed to the public. These rehearsals will be devoted primarily to rehearsing the costumes and the technical effects with the actors. It is the first chance the actors have to work in their costumes, with the lights, the audio effects, and the properties. Mr. Patton explained, and these rehearsals must of necessity be closed.

The second round of dress rehearsals, beginning Saturday July 28, will be open to holders of festival memberships only. Festival members who wish to watch the second round dress rehearsals must present their membership cards at the festival box office in order to receive the gate pass which will admit two persons to each rehearsal. The card must be presented before each rehearsal, the member wishes to see. Certain time for dress rehearsals, as for performances, is 8:30 sharp.

The first rehearsal Saturday, July 28th will be Richard III. Sunday will be "Love's Labor's Lost." Monday will be "Romeo and Juliet" and "Cymbeline" will rehearse Tuesday. Wednesday of that week is opening night, with the initial performance of "Richard III."

### Teachers At Sessions In Portland

Three Jackson county teachers have returned home after attending the 13th classroom teachers national conference, held July 8-20 at Lewis and Clark college in Portland. They are Mrs. Maxine Smith, president of the Department of Classroom Teachers, Oregon Education association, and language teachers in Medford high schools; Mrs. Mabel Hundley, Lone Pine school and Mrs. Elson Turner, Eagle Point.

Over 300 teachers attended the conference, sponsored annually by the Department of Classroom Teachers of National Education association.

Mrs. Smith was one of three directors of special services during the conference. The remaining two directors were Miss Mildred Wharton, OEA vice president and Miss Evelyn Torvord, northwest director of the national department.

The conference was directed by Miss Elizabeth Yank of California, president of the NEA Department of Classroom Teachers. Miss Hilda Maehling, assistant executive secretary of NEA and Dr. Chester Frisbie of Lewis and Clark college.

The theme of the conference, "Public Education — Our Democratic Heritage," was developed through general sessions featuring top speakers of the college and community, and through discussion groups and clinics on professional organization interests.

Speakers included Miss Martha Shull, Portland, newly elected president of NEA, who used as her subject "Cause for Celebration." Other addresses covered "History of the Northwest," "Promoting Emotional Growth in the Classroom," "Science in the Key Classroom Tool," and "Providing for the Truly Undereducated — The Gifted Child — in the Normal Classroom."

Conferees were given an opportunity to elect subjects in two areas for special study. The personal development series included ceramics, travel, French and Spanish, letter and report-writing, developmental reading, and natural history of the northwest. The professional development series included improvement of instruction and professional leadership. Adding to the program from both the cultural and entertainment standpoint were the evening meetings, which included a presentation of "Rit Rita" at the Holladay Bowl and the performance of "The Four Poster" by the Magic Ring theater group, an all-day trip to Bunsenville dam, the fish hatcheries, and Mount Hood, and a tour of the B. P. John Furniture company.
