

### GI Bill of Rights Dies Wednesday For All But Few

Washington—(AP)—The GI Bill of Rights, which sent 2,200,000 ex-GIs to college and trained another 5,600,000 in various vocations dies Wednesday for all but a handful of World War II veterans.

#### Korean Vets To Continue

Veterans of the Korean war, both able and disabled, will continue school and vocational type training for several years under other laws.

After tomorrow the sole right remaining to veterans under the 12-year-old GI Bill of Rights will be under the home and business loan provision. This does not expire until July 25, 1957, and there is a good chance it will be extended.

The education program cost \$14,500,000,000. But a VA spokesman said it will be well repaid in the form of new skills and increased taxes from the higher incomes made possible by the program.

#### Means More Taxes

The average income of veterans who trained under the GI bill is 51 per cent for the past six years compared with an increase of only 19 per cent for nonveterans. This, of course, means more taxes for the government.

A VA spokesman estimated the government's investment will be returned in about 15 years in taxes alone.

Some economists also say the program aided in stabilizing the nation's peacetime economy by keeping more than 2,000,000 veterans out of the shaky labor market.

### Mysterious Sickness Hits College Students

Ypsilanti, Mich.—(AP)—A mysterious sickness sweeping Eastern Michigan College has hospitalized at least 40 students, most of them women.

Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, college president, said Monday night that 38 women and only two men were known victims of the strange malady.

Elliott said the illness does not seem to be serious and is characterized by high fevers, which in some cases have reached 104 degrees, acute diarrhea and vomiting.

He said the cause of the epidemic was not yet known but theorized it may have resulted from something the summer students ate in the women's dormitories. He said he did not know whether the ill male students had eaten at the women's dormitories.

Elliott said the sick students were taken to different hospitals in hopes of isolating the cause of the disease.

### No Forgiveness for GOP if Ike Runs, British Papers Say

London—(AP)—Two British national newspapers said today that the world will never forgive the U.S. Republican party if it "hounds" President Eisenhower into running for a second term merely to serve the party's own needs.

"If the suspicion were ever proved well-founded that a great political party was ready for its own ends to hound this man (Eisenhower) beyond physical endurance, it could never be forgiven," said The Liberal News-Chronicle.

The Socialist Daily Herald said bluntly that "the effort may well kill Ike."

Will Curse Republicans

"If it does, we who like him—and all Americans—will curse the Republican party," the newspaper said. "If Ike is president again, it's a near certainty that his stablemate, the unspeakable Richard Nixon, will finish off his term for him."

The Herald said that "the truth is that Ike is in no state to run again as president."

The more cautious News-Chronicle said that for non-Americans "an element of the machine is creeping into the presidential election." It said that "much is forgiven in the rough arena of politics, but even in politics there should be a limit."

"How far the Democrats can use the President's health is none of our affair, nor does the question of how the Republicans handle it directly concern us." The News-Chronicle added. "But it is absolute nonsense to pretend that the election is beyond foreign comment."

### MPs Investigate Rape Of Young German Girl

Munich, Germany—(AP)—U. S. military police today investigated a report that two American soldiers raped the 18-year-old German wife of a U. S. serviceman.

Mrs. Ingrid McGaha told German police she was assaulted Saturday while walking in the woods near suburban Schleissheim. She said she was carrying her two-week-old baby when she was accosted by two soldiers who attacked her.

German police reported the case to U. S. military authorities. U. S. officials said the girl's husband has been transferred to the United States. They refused to give his full name and address.

A long series of incidents involving U. S. servicemen recently brought demands from German authorities for stricter control of troops.

### Man Wasn't Kidding; Drowning Was Real

Paris, Tenn.—(AP)—Cecil Victor Balthrop's wife and another couple explained today that they laughed while he drowned because he always "kidded a lot" and they thought he was "joking."

Balthrop, 21, of Clarksdale, Tenn., his wife, Evelyn, and the other couple were swimming at the Paris Landing State Park Sunday when Balthrop began crying for help, they said. By the time they realized his trouble was real, they said, it was too late to reach him. A rescue squad recovered the body later.
