New York — The announcement of a lot of people helped her get where she is today. Lillian Roth said gratefully, but the suspicion of a few still complicates her life.

The singer had just finished playing a percent round. She sipped a cup of black coffee and admitted, "The first time I heard it I burst. Now I'm trying to learn to ignore it."

Usually each number is identical. Somebody reports she was at a cocktail party when Miss Roth attended and he saw her take an alcoholic drink.

Occasionally the singer places a glass in hand, and sees two other glasses not nearly so close together. They assume the glass holds something intoxicating.

"That glass could freeze in my hand before I could take another swallow from it," Miss Roth said. "I know I must get over it. I've overcome so many fears."

A Broadway war at 20 is a seemingly hopeless affair. At 30 and now a star aged 45—her story has become familiar to millions under the name "I'll Cry Tomorrow."

She stopped drinking 10 years ago when she joined Alcoholics Anonymous. She was broke, sick, unable to get work and without friends. Now she plays with young couples at just being alive. She has more money, more work and more friends than most people.

### Board of Education Backs Salary Plans; SOC's Name Changed

Portland — UP — The board of higher education yesterday unanimously supported both an immediate pay increase and inauguration of a 12-step academic salary scale for college and university teachers.

This means an appeal will be made to the State Emergency Board for money for the raises.

Chancellor John B. Richards Monday submitted to the board the emergency raise and the new policy of annual step-increases for academic personnel at the state's colleges and universities. The emergency raise would go into effect Sept. 1.

The appeal for salary relief for college teachers will be submitted to the Emergency Board Friday in Salem, Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, president of the board of education, said.

The \$14,852,000 budget for construction at the seven state campuses during the 1957-59 biennium was also given official approval. When the legislature meets next January this building priority list will be presented.

Re-elected for another year were Dr. Kleinsorge and the board's vice-president, Henry Campbell. This will be the fourth term for Dr. Kleinsorge, a Silverton physician.

Leif Finseth of Dallas, was named again as the third member of the board's executive committee of the higher education board.

The board officially changed the names of Eastern and Southern Oregon colleges of education to Eastern Oregon college and Southern Oregon college, at Ashland.

Stevenson Presents Plan  
A 20-year-building and development plan for Southern Oregon college was presented by its president, Dr. Elmo Stevenson.

It is the first such long-time appraisal conducted by any of the state's smaller colleges. The plan calls for \$7,000,000 expansion in the next two decades.

### Pendleton Jury Acquits Man of Kidnap Charge

Ran Out of Gas  
He made his way to Milton-Freewater and hailed a taxicab driven by Nadine Lois Norton.

He directed Miss Norton to drive him westward on the Columbia river highway, but they ran out of gas at an early hour in Hood River. Miss Norton gave him money to get some gas, but he never returned. He was apprehended in a Hood River restaurant two days later.

Stelle still faces charges for assaulting a sheriff's guard and aiding other prisoners in escaping the Umatilla county jail the night of July 5. Stelle and two other prisoners broke out of the jail, only to be captured minutes later by police who had been warned by a witness.

### Copco's Klamath Decision Awaited

Klamath Falls — UP — Officials said today that the Federal Power Commission is expected to rule in September on a California Oregon Power Company request to include Big Bend No. 1 and Big Bend No. 2 projects on the Klamath river in one development.

The company recently filed an amended request with the FPC for the license change. According to the new plans, the development as a single unit would be called Big Bend development.

The 560 foot diversion dam included in the project would create a reservoir with a normal water surface at an elevation of 3793 feet and back water three miles upstream to the tailwaters of the company's Keno dam.

A 2 1/4 mile conduit would connect with previously named Big Bend No. 2 power house site. The power house would have a capacity of 80,000 kilowatts.

The Big Bend development is the first in a \$70,000,000 program which the company plans to build over the next 10 to 12 years. Total output of the project would be 330,000 kilowatts.

### Branch Libraries Get New Volumes

All larger Jackson county branch libraries have been supplied with shipments of 125 volumes during the past month, of which 50 were new publications.

Miss Helen Webster, librarian, has announced.

At the same time shelves were examined for the removal of outworn, outdated, or outread books.

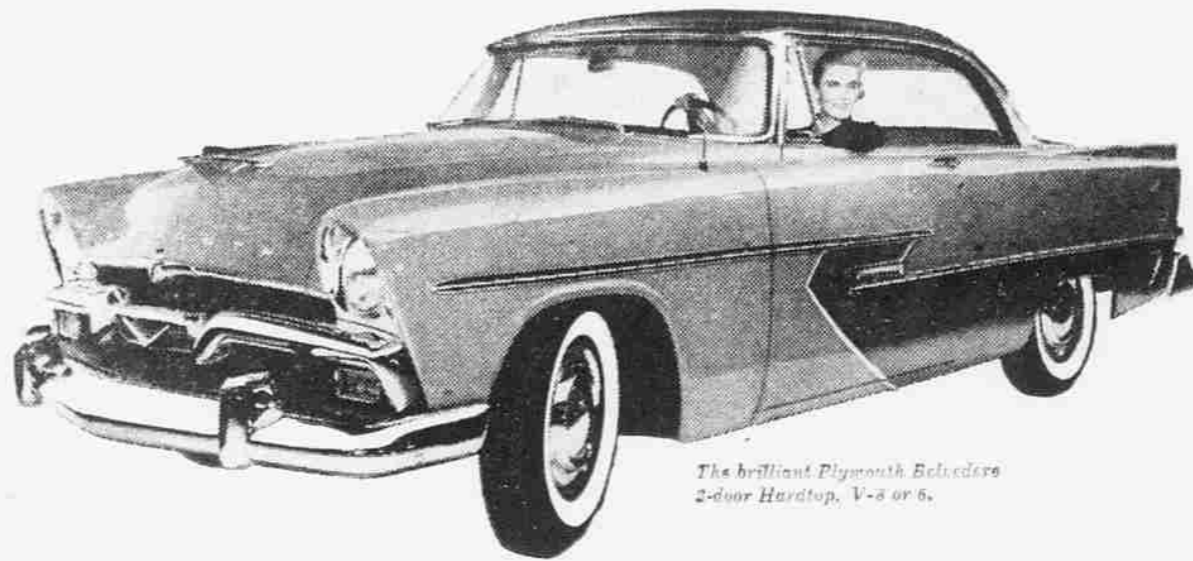
