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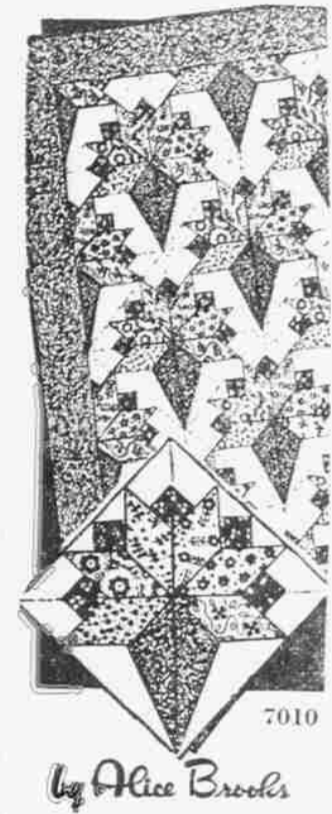
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Head-on Collision Leaves Four Dead

Escondido, Calif.—(U.P.)—Four persons were killed and four injured Tuesday night in a head-on collision on U.S. 395 two miles north of here.

Dead were Mrs. Ellen Congos, 50, Redlands, Calif., wife of one of the drivers; Mrs. Irene Wilson, 38, Portland, Ore.; Mrs. Martha Kangas, 48, Palmsville, Ohio; and Robert Ray Clemons, 25, Pomona, Calif.

The Highway Patrol said a car driven by James Earl Mulvaney, 22, Fortuna, Calif., was traveling south and weaving along the two-lane highway. Witnesses said the other driver, Martin Congos, was forced to pull over in an attempt to avoid the oncoming car.

The crash occurred in the center of the highway.

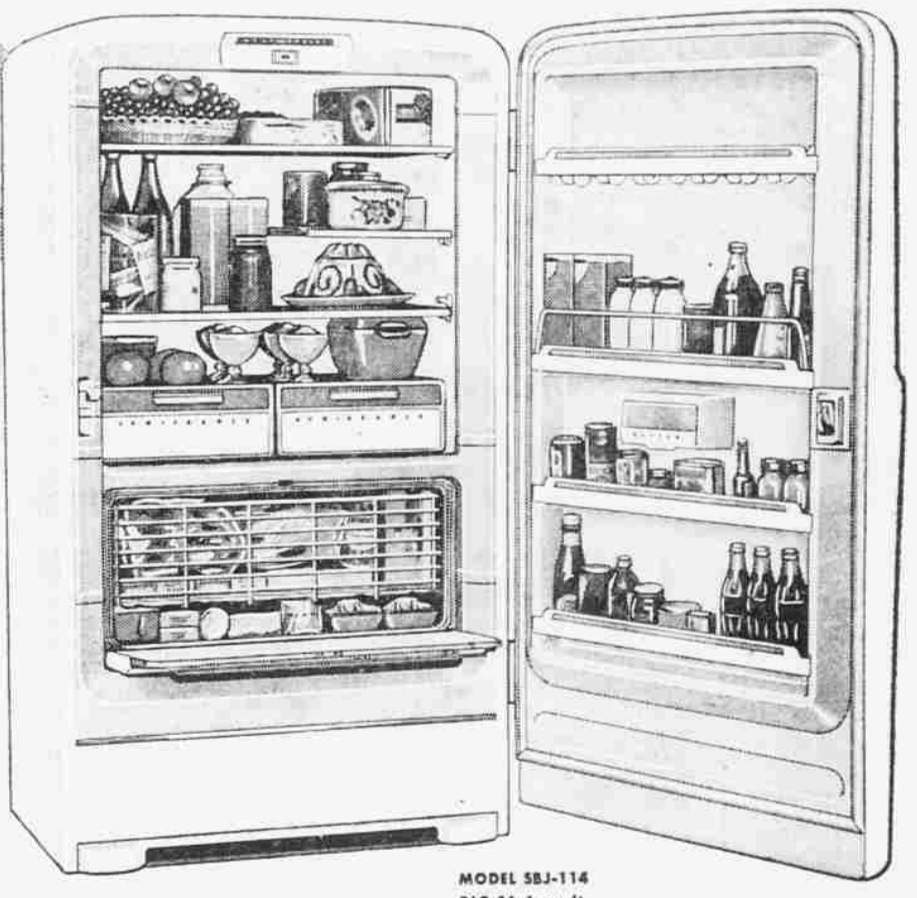
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
