

Civil Rights Legislation Appears To Be Dead At This Session of Congress, Ike Informed

Washington — U.P. — Republican legislative leaders today said that civil rights legislation is practically dead for this session of Congress.

The administration supported bill has been passed by the House and is now in the Senate Judiciary committee, headed by Sen. James O. Eastland (D-Miss.).

Mr. Eisenhower, in what probably will be his last conference with legislative leaders before the session ends probably late this week, was told by Senate GOP Leader William F. Knowland

there seems to be "no likelihood" of getting the civil rights measure passed this session.

President Pleased

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who attended the legislative conference, said the President was "most pleased" by the Senate's passage of the \$4,000,000,000 foreign aid appropriation. Nixon said Mr. Eisenhower considered it an exceptional, bipartisan legislative accomplishment.

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Frying Pan Project Cleared for House

Washington — U.P. — The House Rules committee, reversing itself on a 7 to 3 vote, today cleared for House action the controversial Frying Pan-Arkansas Project in Colorado.

The committee, which Tuesday had refused to clear the bill on a 5 to 3 tie vote, met at an unannounced closed session to reconsider the issue. Two Democrats changed their votes, to provide the margin in support for the bill.

The action means that the Senate approved bill now can be scheduled for a House vote before adjournment.

The administration backed a \$165,000,000, multipurpose reclamation project. It calls for construction of an intermountain tunnel to divert water from the west to the east side of the Continental Divide.

Sen. Millikin Not To Seek Reelection

Washington — U.P. — Sen. Eugene D. Millikin (R-Colo.), announced today that he will not seek reelection because of his health.

The 65-year-old Senate expert on taxes said that "a reappraisal of my health situation" led him to reverse a March announcement. He said then he would be available for the Republican nomination.

Millikin has been in poor health for several years. He was confined to a hospital or his home for a prolonged period last winter with arthritis and a stomach ailment. Since then, he has carried out his senatorial duties in a wheelchair.

He declined to endorse a candidate to succeed himself. Colorado Republicans will hold a meeting in Colorado Springs on Saturday to designate candidates for the nomination to be voted on in a September primary.

Millikin will have served 15 years in the Senate.

Widow Wins \$32,000 On Television Quiz

New York — U.P. — Mrs. Alice Morgan, 78, a widow from Bristol, R.I., won \$32,000 Tuesday night in her banking and finance category on "The \$64,000 Question," television program.

She put herself in a position for a try at the top plateau next week by answering correctly a five-part question on statistics relating to Americans who own corporation stocks.

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Hodge Describes Spending Receipts Of Check Scheme

Springfield, Ill. — U.P. — Former Illinois Auditor Orville E. Hodge admitted he got an estimated \$500,000 from the \$1,000,000 check scheme in his office and spent it on politics, bad investments and high living expenses, a state's attorney disclosed today.

Hodge made the admissions in a "tell all" statement he gave to State's Attorney George P. Costakos in eight hours of questioning last week. Costakos released a summary of the statement to reporters today.

Personally Forged Checks

Hodge also admitted that he personally forged in his handwriting endorsements on 10 state checks cashed in May, 1955, for a total of about \$80,000.

The former auditor said he did not know who made typewritten endorsements on other checks involved in the alleged \$1,000,000 scheme. Hodge took "100 per cent" responsibility for the scandal in his office, and said in the statement "I want to absolve" Edward A. Hintz and Edward A. Epping.

Hintz is resigned president of Southtown Bank and Trust Co., Chicago, where most of the checks were cashed. Hodge identified Epping in his statement as the man who carried the checks to the banks for cashing.

Full of Contradictions

The statement was full of contradictions. Hodge was fuzzy on details of the alleged check scheme.

Forty six indictments containing 276 counts of forgery, confidence game and embezzlement were returned against Hodge by the Sangamon county grand jury Tuesday.

Although attorney Arthur M. Fitzgerald said it was his intention to enter an innocent plea for Hodge, he admitted he had no idea of what the ousted auditor himself planned to do at his arraignment before Circuit Court Judge Dewitt S. Crow.

Work With Mexicans To Be Discussed
