Completion Date Slated for Snake Dams Said Wrong

Washington—UPI—Officials of two engineering consulting firms testified today that two Snake river dams, as proposed by Pacific Northwest Power Co., Portland, Ore., could not be completed by 1960 if started by Dec. 1.

The federal power commission is holding hearings on Pacific Northwest's application for a license to construct the Pleasant Valley and Mountain Sheep dams on the Snake river in Idaho and Oregon at a revised estimated cost of \$217,400,000.

Northwest public power groups and the National Hells Canyon association, which opposed private construction of the Hells Canyon project, are opposing the proposed project by Northwest.

These groups contend that a federal dam should be built at Nez Perce farther down the river from the sites selected by Pacific Northwest.

W. H. Calhoun, vice president of Ebasco Services, Inc., New York, and John R. Kelly, vice president of Bechtel Corp., San Francisco, testified today on the preliminary planning of the two dams and estimated costs.

Ebasco planned the Pleasant Valley project for Pacific Northwest and Bechtel planned the Mountain Sheep project.

Completion Date Told — Kelly and Calhoun testified that both dams could be completed by 1960 if construction were started by Dec. 1 and said Pacific Northwest would begin construction as soon as the FPC grants a license for the project.

The Mountain Sheep dam will be a gravity type dam, Kelly said, because this type is more economical. It is estimated to cost \$50,000,000. Calhoun said an arch type dam would be more economical at Pleasant Valley and would cost an estimated \$95,400,000.

Bladeless Rotating Rod Developed To Dig Potatoes

Washington—UPI—The Agriculture Department's researchers have developed a bladeless, rotating rod with which to dig potatoes. It is designed to replace the digger blade of conventional equipment, which in turn had replaced the spade, pitchfork, hoe, and shovel.

The department said the rotating rod has demonstrated "superior efficiency" in experiments. The rotation of the horizontal bladeless rod lifts potatoes from the soil onto the apron of the digger or harvester. It has aroused the interest of growers and the machinery industry.

Two potato-machinery manufacturers currently are experimenting with their versions of the new digger in Florida, where early potatoes harvest is underway.

The experimental bladeless digger represents a research modification of a commercial two-row blade-type digger, using the rotating rod mechanism from a rotary row weeder, standard tillage and weed control implement. The modified digger was developed by A. H. Graves, department research engineer, at the Red River Valley Potato Research Center, East Grand Forks, Minn.

In the new machine, a power-driven 7 1/2-inch square digger rod replaces the digger blade of conventional equipment. The rod rotates slowly through the soil just below the level of the potatoes, lifting them onto the conveyor apron of the digger.

The department said experiments have proved that:
1. It can operate successfully under soil conditions ranging from dry-cloddy to wet sticky.
2. It digs potatoes with a minimum of vine-clogging, even when the vines are not shredded prior to the digging.

3. It feeds potatoes freely and uniformly onto digger or harvester apron, causing little soil loss.
4. It not only digs potatoes but picks them up from a previously-dug windrow.
5. All digger parts performed well, with no evidence of excessive wear.

Scientists Find Way To Beat Summer Heat
Stanford, Calif.—UPI—A group of scientists headed by Prof. Thomas W. Griggs of the University of Denver and Dr. Cornelius J. Pings, Jr., of Stanford University, have found a sure method to beat the summer heat.

The group is spending the summer camping on a 1300-foot-thick glacier in Greenland. The group spend two months on the ice last year, gathering geological data and measuring the flow of active glaciers and the formation of crevasses.

Nail Holes Help To Build Church Rooms

Chicago—UPI—Nail holes will help build a new addition to the Westminster Presbyterian Church in suburban Skokie.

A four-by-eight-foot plywood panel with a mural of the completed church done in 14,540 nail holes, to be filled in with colored nails stands in the church foyer.

Donations of 25 cents, \$1 and \$2 buy nails to fit the holes, said Mrs. John Cooper, church secretary.

The nail board was dedicated at church services as an extra project to help raise \$135,000 for the proposed addition. The board is expected to raise \$15,762.

Half-inch, flat-headed furniture nails will make up the picture of the church, said Curt E. Nyberg, congregation member who designed the board.

One part of the mural is reserved for children. The younger church members can fill in cloud outlines with 25 cents donations.
