

Withdrawal From PCC Not Likely

Eugene — UP — The chance of withdrawal from the Pacific Coast Conference was regarded as "about one in ten-thousand" here today by Dean Orlando Hollis of the University of Oregon law school, veteran Oregon representative on the conference.

Hollis added that the chance of a single member of the conference withdrawing at the Portland PCC meeting August 6-8 "is nearly as slim."

At the same time, Hollis predicted there would be new pressures brought to bear before the Portland meeting to reduce penalties levied against some members schools for illegal subsidies for players.

But he said he did not believe any reduction of penalties could be made "without losing our firm foundation of principle. It would also open the way to the reversal of all penalties."

Hollis, who has been the University's representative to the PCC since 1940 and who is a former conference president, charged there had been recent efforts to "confuse the public and belaud the real issues."

Commenting on the penalties for subsidized freshmen players and the lack of penalties for seniors, Hollis said "I don't believe there is a logical argument for such action in favor of the seniors."

Hollis said the conference action against subsidy rules should have come as no surprise to member schools.

"In 1952 the presidents' council took a strong stand in favor of eliminating illegal subsidy," he said, "and then wrote every athletic staff member at all institutions to make certain there could be no misunderstanding of their desire to eliminate illegal aid."

Drag Race Drivers Meet Sunday in Battle of Speed

Hot rod skippers will be aiming to better the strip record of 120.84 miles per hour Sunday when they convene at Camp White for the second competi-

tion of the season under the sponsorship of the Southern Oregon Towing association.

Oregon and northern California drivers will contend. Time trials are scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Drags are set for 1 p.m. No entries will be taken after noon.

Length of the SOTA drag strip at Camp White is one-fourth mile. Cars are clocked for attained speed at the end of the one-fourth mile by an electronic clock accurate up to one one-hundredth of a second. After cars have been divided by classification Sunday and after they have been timed in, they will be matched against each other. Through a process of elimination, a winner will be picked in each class.

Larger Entry Seen
Two weeks ago the track had 60 entries in 13 classes and a larger entry is anticipated this time. Top speeds last time were 89.10 mph by a 1956 Chevrolet and 96 by a motorcycle. Jerry Lausmann, president of SOTA, holds the strip record, set in 1954.

Because of the high speed of the cars, SOTA officials have instructed spectators to stay behind the ditch which borders the strip. Pit area will be "off limits" to spectators during the time trials and drags. Members of the crowd, however, may inspect the pit during the intermission and after the drags.

Vince Moreci was the big wheel at Yakima where his two homers drove in all the runs as Yakima topped Spokane 3-2.

Moreci hit No. 21 in the sixth with one aboard and added No. 22 in the bottom of the ninth to break a 2-2 deadlock.

Larry Walker, 19-year-old rookie seeing his first profes-

sional action, shared honors with Moreci. He came on in the ninth with two Spokane runs already across and retired the side, fanning Jerry Jackson to end the Spokane rally.

burg at 7:00. A double-header at 1:30 is slated and another double-header Sunday night at 7 and 9.

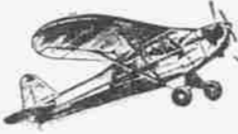
Monday night features another double-header at 7 and 9.

A consolation title game is set for Tuesday evening at 7, finishing off with the championship game at 9 p.m.

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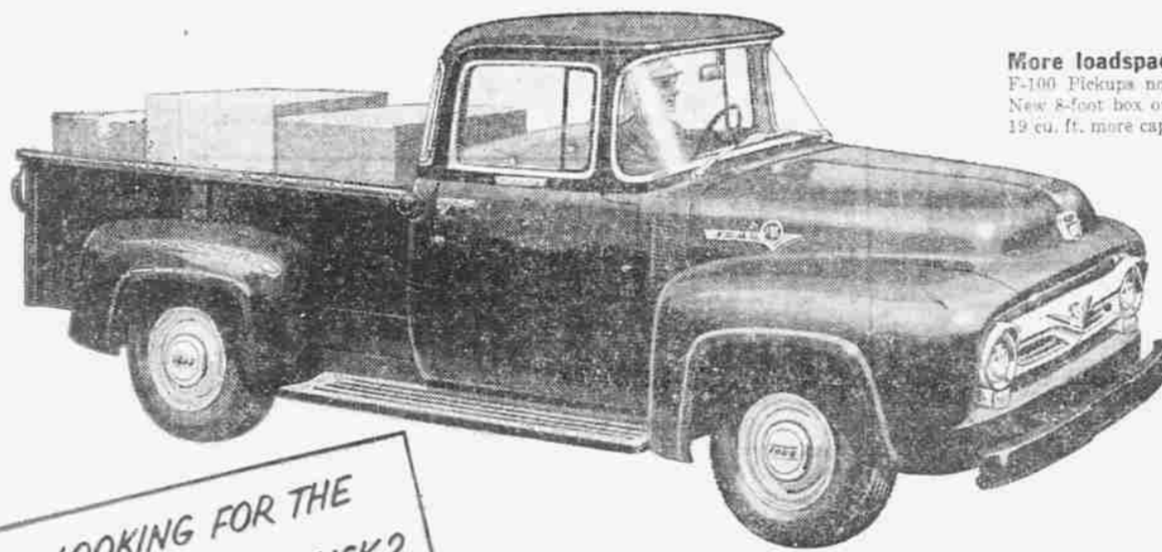
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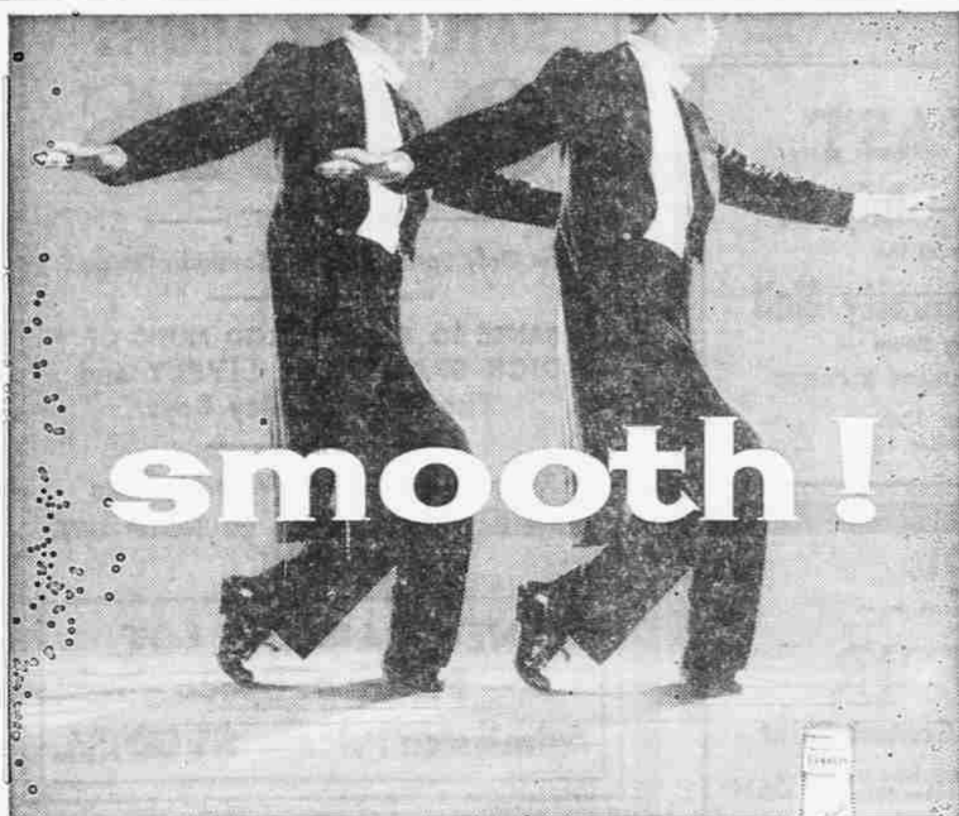
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
