Engineer Aviation Brigade at Camp

Thirty-two officers and men of the 417th engineer aviation brigade, an Army reserve unit which has permanent headquarters in Medford, are currently under going two-week summer field training at Yakima firing center, Yakima, Wash.

Col. William H. Prentice, Medford, is commander of the unit. While in Yakima, the 417th will perform the normal duties of an engineer headquarters unit. Four corps of engineers units which are taking training at the same time have been attached to the brigade for the period.

At present, the combined groups are working on various construction projects in the vicinity of the firing center, July 31 and Aug. 1 they plan an overnight field exercise. Prisoners Halt 'Sit-Down' Strike As Warden Quits

Wethersfield, Conn. — (UPI) — A six-hour "sit-down strike" by 300 state prison inmates ended early Saturday when Warden George Cummings said "I know when I'm licked."

Cummings scheduled a meeting with Gov. A. A. Ribicoff Saturday morning amid speculation that he might offer his resignation.

The warden told the inmates "I'm going to move out of here. There's no question about it."

The meeting was called after the warden gave in to many of the prisoners' demands, without pacifying them. The disturbance, which was without violence began at 7:45 o'clock Friday night when the inmates refused to return to their cells from the prison recreation yard until they could talk with newsmen. The warden complied with their wishes and reporters were summoned.

The inmates next chanted a demand for release of a 30-year prisoner from an isolation cell. Leroy Nash was removed from the so-called "hole" and Cummings promised not to resort to solitary confinement anymore, pending settlement of the dispute.

The warden then signed a statement, promising that the inmates' complaints will be presented to the prison board of directors and to state legislators. This still failed to pacify most of the prisoners so the warden climbed a wall and pleaded with them for 20 minutes. They gradually trickled back to their cells and the disturbance was over by 2 a. m.

The warden said, "I've been in this game long enough to know when I'm licked." Cummings has been in prison work for 23 years, the last two as warden.

President of Peru Officially in Office

Lima, Peru — (UPI) — Dr. Manuel Prado became president of Peru Saturday as the result of this nation's first free election in 11 years.

Prado succeeds Manuel A. Odría, who became president after leading a successful military coup against the government in 1948.

Prado was elected to office June 17. The last previous free elections in Peru were held in 1945.

The four-day inauguration program, coinciding with Peru's independence celebration, was scheduled to open Saturday afternoon when diplomatic missions from 40 countries present their credentials.

U.S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles flew to Lima from the recent American presidents' conference in Panama to attend the inauguration. He interrupted his diplomatic schedule Friday to confer with Washington in connection with several hours in connection with Egypt's seizure of the Suez Canal.

Dulles cancelled a sightseeing tour arranged for him by the Peruvian government. He was scheduled to leave Lima for Washington Sunday night.
