Event Announced By Phoenix Church

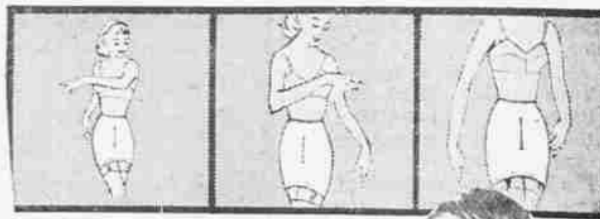
Phoenix — The annual ice cream social sponsored by the Women's Association of Phoenix Presbyterian church will be held Friday evening August 3.

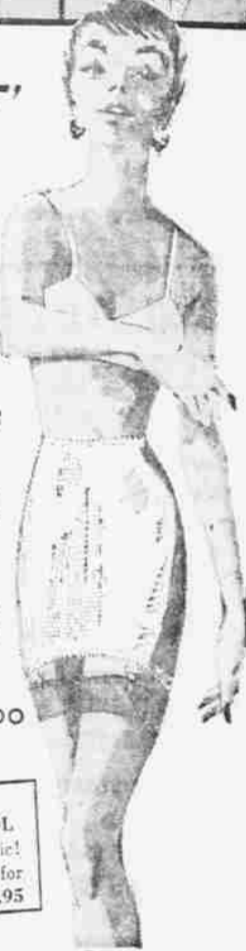
