

Boudreau Says Mantle Bests Williams As Power Hitter

Baltimore, Md. — (AP) — Kansas City Manager Lou Boudreau said today that Mickey Mantle is "a greater power hitter than Ted Williams."

Boudreau, whose athletics field the mighty New York Yankees slugger to four singles in the three-game series which ended Sunday, said Mantle has the potential of being "one" of the greatest players in baseball today.

He didn't rate Mantle as a greater hitter than Williams but as a greater power hitter with strength to all parts of the field.

"Mantle can hit anywhere and

is strongest in center, left center and to the right, but he has a lot of years to go before he is the established hitter that Williams is," said Boudreau.

Asked why he invented the "Mickey Mantle shift" this season if Mantle had strength to all fields, Boudreau said:

"The shift is to try to make him lose power and to keep him from pulling in Yankee stadium. It served its purpose."

"Of course he can hunt against it—which he has done—but that just makes the shift successful because we use it to keep him from hitting homers."

New York — (AP) — Lightweight Carlos Ortiz of New York and Tommy Salem of Cleveland will meet in a return TV 10-rounder at St. Nicholas Arena on Sept. 17 if the seventh-stitch cut on unbeaten Ortiz' left brow heals in time for training.

Ortiz, 20, suffered the blow-gash in the fourth round Monday night while winning a split decision of St. Nick's over 23-year-old Salem for his 16th straight professional victory.

New Yorker Carlos, favored at 13-5, weighed 135 pounds and Salem, 132-4, for the engagement that marked the first 10-rounder for each.

For Dichter it was the second straight year that he has won the medal honors as the men under 40 and the seniors shot qualifying rounds.

The defending under 40 champion, Dusty Woods, of McMinnville, did not take part in yesterday's play but planned to be on hand when match play in the division opens Wednesday.

Pendleton's Raley Peterson and Ed Thompson of Astoria tied for medal honors in the senior division, each turning in a card of 75. They will play off for the medal trophy at a later date.

Frank Lane Speaks Out Against Umps

New York — (AP) — General Manager Frank Lane of the St. Louis Cardinals warned today that "bad work by the umpires is driving fans from the ball parks."

"I'm not an umpire biter — in fact I think it is a crime that for a veteran umpire is paid less for doing his job than a utility infielder," Lane declared. "But we're getting an awful lot of bad work by these fellows. What is more, one inefficient umpire in a crew of four can spoil a whole game. The fans get riled up and the players on both benches start getting on all of the other umpires."

Lane admitted that National League President Warren C. Giles had sent him a long letter in connection with remarks Lane made last week that Umpire Frank Secory "ought to pay to get in to see a game." But he made it plain that he would not be hushed up in his criticism of umpires.

Richardson, Seixas Sent Against Mexico

Tiger Jones Gets Decision

Portland, Ore. — (AP) — Ralph "Tiger" Jones, aching for a title go with middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson, punched out a unanimous decision over Jesse Turner Monday night in a ten-rounder at the public auditorium.

Jones scored heavily in the later stages of the fight after a slow moving start. In the seventh the Tiger had his best round of the night, finally moving in with his combinations, but never really rocked Turner.

Referee Eddie Volk scored it 58-51 for Jones, 51-47 for Turner. Judge Ralph Gruman's card was nearly identical, scoring it 58-52 for Jones while Judge Dick Wagner saw it 63-47 for the Yorkers, N.Y., slugger.

Turner had his best round in the third when he first brought his flashing right into action. The next three rounds were slow with Jones occasionally moving in to score good solid blows.

Tommy Thomas, 142 pounder from Portland, took a decision over Seattle's Teddy Hall in the semi-windup six rounder. In the other six-rounder on the preliminary card, Burt Singer, 142, of Seattle won a first round KO over Johnny Fletcher, 144, Seattle.

Portland, Ore. — (AP) — The Portland Beavers shouldered their way into a fifth place tie with Sacramento Monday night by drubbing the Solons, 10-0, in the only game played in the Pacific coast league.

Portland scored the win in a very convincing manner behind the five-hit pitching of Dick Feidler, who went into the contest with a paltry 1-6 record.

Every Beaver on the starting lineup got at least one hit, except third baseman Leo Thomas — and Thomas scored a run. Shortstop Jack Littrell was the only one that failed to cross the plate for the home team.

Centerfielder Tom Saffell and catcher Sam Calderone were the big guns in Portland's potent attack. Each man got three hits and scored two runs.

Big Ed Mickelson rapped out a pair of doubles in four times at the plate, and Bob Borkowski slammed out his 12th homer of the year in the fifth to give the Beavers a 5-0 lead.

The two teams meet again tonight, while Los Angeles hosts San Francisco, Hollywood visits Seattle, and San Diego plays at Seattle.

Applications for Early Hunting Should Be Submitted Immediately

Portland — Big game hunters who wish to participate in the antelope and early deer and elk hunts should submit their applications immediately, according to the word from the Oregon Game commission.

Application blanks are now available at all license agencies, game commission regional offices, and the Portland headquarters, 1634 S. W. Alder. Deadline for submitting applications for these early August and September hunts is 5 p.m. August 7. Public drawings will be held on August 10 beginning at 10 a.m.

The antelope season is set for September 1 through September 5 with 200 permits issued for each of the three antelope areas. Each permit validates the taking of one buck antelope during the hunt. A fee of \$5 must accompany all applications.

Early deer seasons include the Drewsey area August 18 through August 21 with 500 permits, the Minam area September 1 through September 5 with 500 permits and the Upper Innaha area September 1 through September 5 with 300 permits, and the Lower Innaha area September 1 through September 5 with 500 permits. A fee of \$5 must be submitted with the application for these four hunts.

Successful applicants for the Minam, Upper and Lower Innaha deer hunts will receive one antlerless deer tag and a permit which will validate their general deer tag for the taking of any deer during the authorized controlled season. In other words, the drawing tag will allow the hunter to take one antlerless deer, and the permit validates the taking of an additional deer, either buck or doe, on his regular deer tag.

Early elk seasons include the Promise area August 18 through August 27 with 300 permits, the Leap area August 18 through August 27 with 100 permits, the Flora area August 18 through August 27 with 200 permits, and the Ten Mile Lake area September 1 through September 4 with 100 permits. These hunts authorize successful applicants to take one elk of either sex.

No fee is required for the elk drawings, but applicants must have a 1956 elk tag and report the number on the application.

Only resident hunters may apply for controlled season tags or permits. Applications may be made by an individual or party of not more than four persons.

Persons who received a tag or permit in 1955 are not eligible to apply for a tag or permit for the same species in 1956. No person may submit more than one application for a given species or season. However, after failure to draw on an early application he may apply for a later season for the same species.

In the event the number of applications received does not exceed the number of tags or permits authorized, the remaining tags or permits will be issued or sold on a first come first serve basis to any resident hunter, provided that no person may apply for more than one tag or permit for any one season.

Where a fee is charged for a tag or permit, money must be submitted with the application.
