Former Resident Is Author of Digest Article

John Reddy, author of "The Most Unforgettable Character I've Met" in the August issue of Reader's Digest, lived in Medford as a boy and is well known in the city. Mr. Reddy now lives in New York City.

Mr. Reddy wrote of Dudley Field Malone, attorney who served as assistant secretary of state in the Wilson administration, was at one time collector of the port for New York and later became a motion picture actor.

According to the author, Mr. Malone might have been almost anything, so great were his gifts, but he spent his talents and wealth extravagantly, and the career that began with such promise ended in eclipse. He had nothing left except his friends, but no one ever had more of them.

NBC Announces 1956 Broadcast Of Festival Play

Ashlans—The Oregon Shakespearean festival will be on the air, coast to coast, Tuesday evening August 22, with its sixth annual broadcast over NBC.

The program this year is taken from "Richard III," with key scenes from the powerful tragedy adapted for radio broadcast.

As in past years, Andrew C. Love, NBC producer-director, will create the show in Ashland for the network. Love will arrive here on Monday, August 6, the show will be tape-recorded on the festival stage at 11 a.m., August 11, and will be released over the network at 6:30 p.m. EDS time August 22. The network's week end "Monitor" show prevents "live" broadcasts, but "Monitor" will carry short reports on the festival nationally during the season.

In addition to scenes from the play, the broadcast also features a short interview between Angus Bowmer, festival founder and producer-director, and Jennings Pierce, former NBC official who was instrumental in originating the annual broadcast in 1951.

Script and adaptation for the national broadcast was by William Dawkins, NBC-affiliate KMED Medford, will supply facilities and engineer the show.

QUICK BREAD

New York—A new mix makes baking of bread at home easier. It eliminates kneading. However, mixing water with yeast still is necessary. The manufacturer said that the home-maker need only combine the mix with the yeast-water combination, and blend until it is of doughy consistency. Then, the dough is put on a board, flattened out to 1/2 inch thickness, rolled into a loaf and baked for 1 hour. The package contains enough mix for two loaves.
