Activities for Gold Rush Jubilee Listed

Jacksonville—Activities for the ninth annual Jacksonville Gold Rush Jubilee, sponsored by Lions clubs of the valley, have been announced by O. W. Skeel Dunford, general chairman.

Clubs sponsoring the two-day event include the Talent, Crater, Medford, and Jacksonville Lions clubs. Associate chairmen are Frank Christian, Murry Dumas and Glenn Linn.

Queen's Ball
The annual Queen's ball will be held starting at 9 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 1, in the Jacksonville Community hall, when the Queen will be named from among nine candidates. Naming of the queen is scheduled about 11 p.m. and is selected on the basis of the number of tickets sold for the Jubilee.

Activities will start at 10 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 4, with an introduction of officials and coronation of the Queen at the judge's court in front of the U.S. Hotel. Russ Jamison of Medford will serve as master of ceremonies.

A Riddles parade will be held on California at starting at 10:30 a.m. Saturday and between 11 and 12 noon there will be a free bar-b-que at the Jacksonville High school field. Blise Heine's band will present a concert at the judge's stand at noon.

Art Exhibit
The sixth annual art exhibit

sponsored by the Southern Oregon Society of Artists will open at the library at noon Saturday, and gold panning, prospecting, and a watermelon eating contest are scheduled at 12:15 and 12:30 p.m.

Saturday afternoon events include 4-H judging at the high school field, an address by William C. Rollins, district governor of Lions clubs, at the Jacksonville museum at 2 p.m., and several entertainment performances, including log bucking, ax throwing and chopping contests.

Among entertainers will be Miss Pat's dancers, Colleen Hope dancing group, Mrs. Alexander's Hawaiian band, Dave Ashton and his guitar, Casar Muzzioli's serenading band and the Forest Chappin Guitar studio.

Pageant Scheduled
At 8:15 p.m. Saturday, a pageant will be presented in the Jacksonville city hall. John Lane's dance band will furnish music for dancing between 9 p.m. and 1 a.m. at the Community hall.

Sunday activities include 10 a.m. mass at Historic St. Joseph's Catholic church and 11 a.m. services at the Presbyterian, Assembly of God church and the Old Pioneer Methodist church.

Afternoon Program
The afternoon program starts with the Old Fashion parade at 12:30 p.m. and the grand parade at 1 p.m.

Dr. Clifford Miller of Southern Oregon college will speak at the museum at 2:30 p.m.

Other afternoon activities include entertainment by various musical groups and an Old Fiddlers' contest at the judges' stand at 4 p.m. There will be dancing at the community hall between 9 p.m. and 1 a.m.

Josephine Fair to Mark Centennial
Grants Pass—Josephine county fair will mark its centennial with four full days of events Aug. 8 through 11.

Activities at the fairgrounds include world championship rodeo competition Wednesday and Thursday nights; old fashioned political rallies Friday and Saturday; a hot stock auction Friday; and Kibanza kids day; horse racing; a horse show and the centennial pageant on Saturday.

There will be dancing every night. Post fair horse racing is scheduled for the afternoon of Sunday, Aug. 12.

Christenson brothers will present the rodeo, Friday will be Democratic day in the political activity. U. S. Senator Wayne Morse, congressional aspirant Charles O. Porter and gubernatorial nominee Robert D. Holmes will be on hand. Republicans will rally on Saturday.

The Davis Show carnival will be at the fairgrounds all four days. Youngsters will be able to take the rides at reduced rates on kids day and Kiwanians plan special games for boys and girls.

Saturday horse racing will be at 1 p.m. and there will be a gymkhana. The pageant will be an 8 p.m. event.

Most of the feature events of the fair will be in the covered arena, only one of its type in this part of Oregon.

Beaverton Woman Dies In Nevada Auto Wreck
Las Vegas, Nev.—UP—Mrs. Barbara Jean Connelly, 24, of Beaverton, Ore., was fatally injured and her son, Steven Mitchell Connelly, 2, suffered a minor head bruise yesterday when their car overturned on U. S. Highway 95, 70 miles northwest of here.

Officers said Mrs. Connelly was dead on arrival at Southern Nevada Memorial hospital. The boy was admitted to the hospital for observation and treatment.

Gunman Arrested in Murder at Tijuana

Tijuana, Mex.—UP—Manuel Duenas, described by Mexican authorities as a known gunman today was held for the assassination of local newspaperman Manuel Acosta Meza.

Bala California Attorney General Porfirio Diaz Sibajas said Duenas was one of four men arrested shortly after the victim was gunned down in front of his fashionable home Thursday night. Acosta Meza had been conducting a campaign against corruption, vice and narcotics in the border city.

Meanwhile, police posted guards outside the home of Carlos Ortega, associate of Acosta in the publishing of El Imparcial. Ortega, also president of the Lower California Newspapermen's Association, had received a telephone threat against his life.

Ortega said he would continue to publish despite the threat and slaying of his associate. He said Acosta Meza prior to his death had announced plans to publish a list of names of those giving and receiving bribes.
